NEWS FROM SACRAMENTO by E.B. Edmondson After 4 of the scheduled 17 rounds in the annual championship tourney of the Capital City Chess Club, M.K. Saca has taken an early lead with 4-0. Bunched just beneath him at this stage are N.T. Austin, Ed Edmondson, George Flynn, and J. Scheuerman, all with $3\frac{1}{2}$ - $\frac{1}{2}$. Mr. Saca's score is the more impressive for including wins over Bill Haines and Dr. Janushkowsky, our defending champion.

In the Stockton Chess Club's annual championship tournament R. Leigh has taken an early lead with 5-0. Pittsburg is also holding its annual tournament, but no word has been received on its progress.

Note on the perils of annotating chess games: In Newsletter No. 2 I wrote that, in the Whisler-Leigh game, White could have drawn by 37.K-R1. Several members of the Stockton Chess Club proved my analysis wrong; Black has an easy win anyway.
