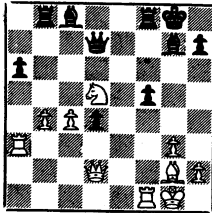

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TEAM TOURNAMENTS IN MARCH AND APRIL

The annual team matches dominated activity in California chess during the Spring. Dozens of teams competed in a full schedule. In May, the regional teams Yankees vs. Rebels in southern California and San Francisco vs. the East Bay in northern California would warm up for the North-South match at Fresno.

In southern California, the most startling development was that the Herman Steiner and Santa Monica Bay teams, first and second in Division A last year, dropped out of the league team matches and played their own "World Series." Santa Monica won the match; meanwhile, Downey won the Division A title.

In northern California, Golden Gate won the Division A title of the San Francisco Bay Area Chess League. The University of California and Mechanics' Institute teams tied for second. In the Bay Area Industrial League, the San Quentin Prison team won another championship.

SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA CHESS LEAGUE TEAM TOURNAMENT

The annual team tournament of the Southern California Chess League was played during March and April. There were 29 teams in three divisions—a reduction from the 38 teams of 1964. The most conspicuous absences were the Steiner Masters and Santa Monica, last year's first and second teams in Division A.

With the two powerhouses absent, the Downey and City Terrace teams had a close contest in Division A. City Terrace led until the next-to-the-last round, when they were upset by the Monterey Park team, 4-2. In the last round, City Terrace had a bye while Downey won the title by defeating Monterey Park $3\frac{1}{2}$ - $2\frac{1}{2}$.

The two critical matches were City Terrace-Monterey Park and Downey-Monterey Park. As these matches occurred in the last two rounds, the tension was strong and the matches were hard-fought. It was perhaps the deciding factor that the top two boards against City Terrace, Cunningham and Alonso, did not play against Downey.

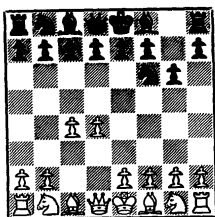

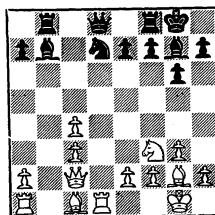

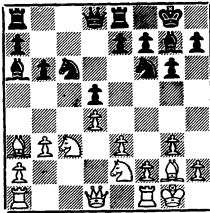

Instead of demonstrating any advantage for White, R. Byrne lost in 21 moves!

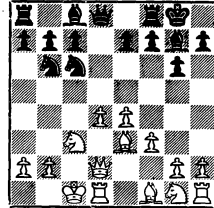
The conclusion from all this is that unless White can come up with some better moves the continuation 3. P-K Kt3, P-B3! leaves him nothing.

BOOK REVIEW

The Chess Career of Rudolf Spielmann 1903-1926. Edited and arranged by Jack L. Spence, 540 Securities Bldg., Omaha 2, Nebraska. Alfred Kalnajs Printing Company, Chicago. 255 pp. \$3.75.

Volume I of the chess career of Rudolf Spielmann was first published in 1961. The first of three volumes, the edition reviewed was received in 1963 and we hereby apologize to our good friend Jack Spence for the excessive delay. The second and third volumes are edited and ready for the printer. If the printing of the next two volumes is dependent upon the successful sale of the first volume, let us hope that this review will encourage enough people to buy it.

Spielmann was born in Vienna in 1883 and died in 1942. He was a romantic chessplayer who preferred the King's Gambit and the Vienna to the hyper-modern openings of his contemporaries. His style was attacking and he was a disciple of Anderssen and Steinitz. He abhorred draws and many of his mediocre results came from over-extending himself. He was an excellent annotator but only produced a few books: The Art of Sacrifice, the tournament book Bad Sliac 1932, and a collection of Karl Schlechter's games.

The book covers the period 1903, when Spielmann was twenty, to 1926. Among the famous tournaments represented are Scheveningen, Nuremberg, Ostend, Carlsbad, St. Petersburg, San Sebastian, Bad Pistyan, Mannheim, Treplitz-Schonau, Meran, and Moscow. Spielmann's opponents include Tarrasch, Duras, Schlechter, Rubinstein, Janowski, Tartakower, Alekhine, Maroczy, Capablanca and Reti.

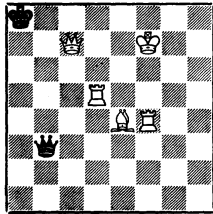
The book contains 75 games. The notes are Spielmann's.

Dagvladet Svallposten" 1921

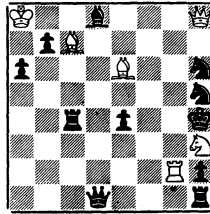
