EDITORIAL

The unhappy demise of CHESS DIGEST early this year left the chess players of California without any organ for the systematic publication of chess news. It has been the fate of chess publications in the past to quietly expire unless they enjoyed the support of some solid organization of chess players. The present issue of the Reporter is made possible by the generous financial support of the San Francisco Bay Area Chess League, which voted funds for publication at the meeting of May 6, 1951. In order to guarantee continuation of the Reporter, it is estimated that 350 subscriptions will be needed. This is not a large number in comparison with the number of active chess players in California. The present editors feel that with reasonable cooperation of the principal chess leagues of California the Reporter will be a permanent fixture of California chess activity. At any rate, all chess players may rest assured that the present editors are determined to do everything in their power to make the publication a success.

The Reporter will, of course, emphasize California chess. However, national news, international news, selected master games, analyses of openings, etc. will be included. As much space will be devoted to important chess matters as is needed. It is planned to issue at occasional intervals special supplements, which will sell for 50¢ to subscribers, and \$1.00 to non-subscribers. The first supplement will appear this Fall, and will consist of the complete score of the World Championship Match between W. Steinitz and Dr. Em. Lasker in 1894. The games of this match are not very well known to the younger generation of chess players, and the first supplement should be a welcome addition to their chess libraries.

The Reporter welcomes suggestions from all chess players. The editors would like to hear an expression of opinion concerning the inclusion of a problem and end-game department. It is possible that a number of players would like to see a special "Challenge Problem" each month. It goes without saying that the success of the Reporter depends upon a steady flow of news, opinions and the like from all parts of the State. We trust that all chess players in California will look upon the Reporter as their outlet.

It is the intent of the editors to make this publication as high-class as possible. For this reason, all material received from correspondents will be critically reviewed. It is to be hoped that no one will feel insulted or slighted if his material should not be published. It is in the interest of all lovers of chess that a rather strict editorial policy be established and maintained in this regard.

Normally, 10 issues of the Reporter will be published each year, as well as several supplements. No issue will appear for September of 1951. The October issue will contain, as a main item, the results of the California State Championship and the California Open Championship. (But on this matter, see comments below.)

CALIFORNIA STATE CHAMPIONSHIP In the last issue of CHESS DIGEST appeared a letter signed by William H. Steckel of Los Angeles, indicating that a considerable number of strong Southern California players favored conducting the State Championship as an Open tournament, presumably on the basis of a Swiss system. Earlier, at a meeting on November 12, 1950, the San Francisco Bay Area Chess League voted unanimously in favor of continuing the present system, consisting of preliminary qualifying tournaments in the North and South, with a final round-robin, in which the California State Champion and the California Open Champion are seeded. Whatever the final agreement may be, it is necessary that it be arrived at quickly.

NORTHERN CALIFORNIA CHAMPIONSHIP This tournament will be conducted as a round-robin, to be played at the rate of one game per week. Play will normally occur on Sunday, but games may be played on Friday by mutual agreement of the opponents. The tournament will start about the middle of June, and will be open to players enjoying Master or Expert rating. Entrance fee is \$10.00. All players interested in participating should communicate promptly with H. J. Ralston, 184 Edgewood Avenue, San Francisco 17. Play will occur at the Mechanics' Institute.

CALIFORNIA OPEN CHAMPIONSHIP Arrangements for this tournament, open to all players, and conducted as a Swiss system, are about completed. Play will occur at the Riverside Hotel, Santa Cruz, September 1-3. A preliminary meeting of all participants will be held the evening of August 31. The entrance fee is \$5.00, and the tournament will be directed by George Koltanowski. It is important that players make reservations promptly. Inquiries concerning accommodations should be sent to Mr. Jensen, 202 Naglee Street, Santa Cruz. Bring sets and clocks. The tournament is sponsored by the Santa Cruz Chamber of Commerce.

SAN FRANCISCO BAY AREA CHESS LEAGUE The Castle Chess Club won the Class A division for 1950-51 by defeating the Oakland Chess Club in a tie-breaking match. Final scores: Castle $3\frac{1}{2}-\frac{1}{2}$, Oakland $2\frac{1}{2}-1\frac{1}{2}$, Russians 1-2, University of California 0-3. Wade Hendricks of the Castle Chess Club won the prize for the best individual record, with a perfect score of 4 out of 4.

Palo Alto won the B Division for the second successive year, with a score of 6-1. Barton and Russians tied for second and third, with Hakoah fourth. Tower, Chinese, San Jose and Berkeley trailed. Wallace Hazz of Palo Alto and Robert Currie of Barton won prizes for the best individual scores, with perfect records of 5 out of 5.

CENTRAL CALIFORNIA CHESS LEAGUE Some 110 players, representing seven clubs, participated in the annual matches this year. San Jose won top honors with a perfect score of 6-0, followed by Stockton 5-1, Fresno 4-2, Sacramento 3-3, Modesto 2-4, Oakdale and Pittsburg $\frac{1}{2}$ -5 $\frac{1}{2}$. San Jose scored a fine 80% in 56 games played, thoroughly outdistancing Stockton's 57%.

SACRAMENTO CITY CHAMPIONSHIP R. E. Russell of Auburn is the 1951 Sacramento City Champion. Leaders in the 6-round Swiss were: Russell, 5-1; J. B. Gee, N. T. Austin and S. S. Kozen 4 $\frac{1}{2}$ -1 $\frac{1}{2}$; M. O. Meyer 4-2. Nineteen players participated.

NORTHERN CALIFORNIA CHESS RATINGS The second revised version, as of May 1, will be published in the San Francisco Chronicle and in Sacramento Chess News. Hereafter, the Reporter will be the official organ for publication of ratings. It is strongly to be hoped that the Northern California and Southern California ratings will be incorporated into a single system and published simultaneously.

LATE NEWS An international tournament, arranged by the Manhattan Chess Club, is due to start in New York, June 4. Najdorf, Balbochan, O'Kelly, Rossolimo, Euwe, Reshevsky, Denker, Kashdan, Horowitz, Byrne, Bisguier and one other to be selected will play.

The United States Championship, this year an invitational event, will be played in New York from July 28 to August 18. Sixteen experts have been invited.

WORLD CHAMPIONSHIP MATCH The match for the Chess Championship of the World between World Champion Mikhail Botvinnik (age 40) and Challenger David Bronstein (age 27) has just been concluded in Moscow. The final score was 12-12, each player scoring 5 wins with 14 draws. Botvinnik therefore retains his title.
