The solution to Problem #1 was P-B6. This problem has what is known as a "star-flight" theme because of the pattern of flight squares of the black king.

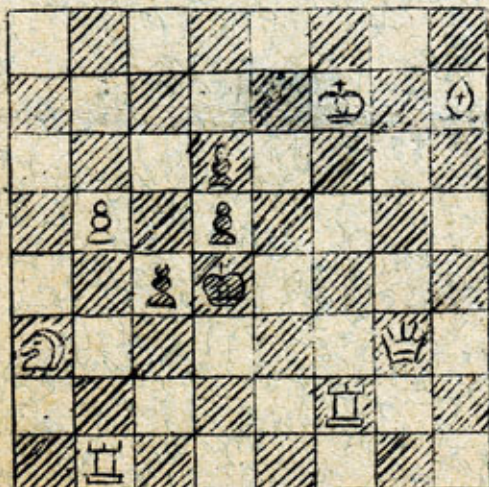
