In addition to the main event, there was a separate Junior section which was won by Dennis Fung. Both events were directed by Charles Maddigan and Steve Quen. Trophies or books will be awarded to prizewinners.

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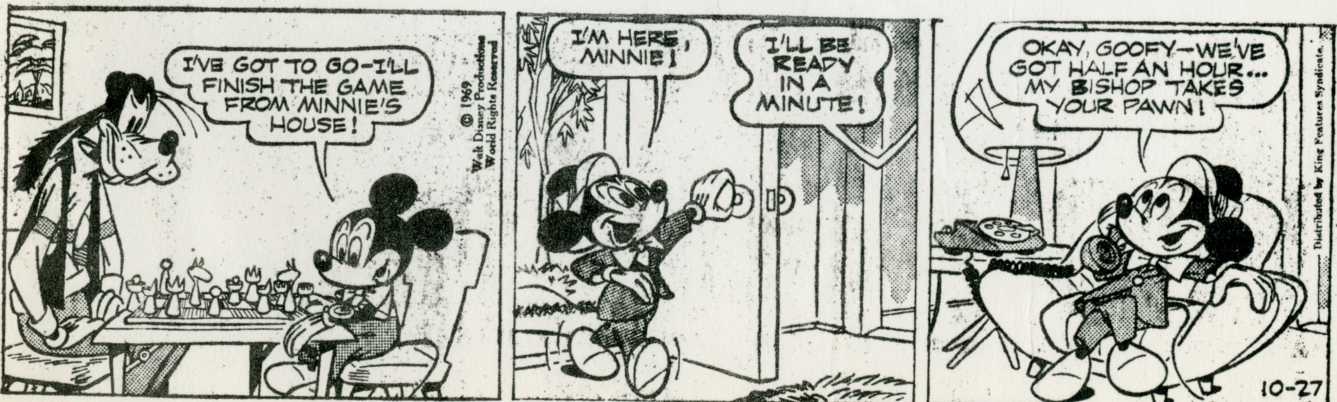

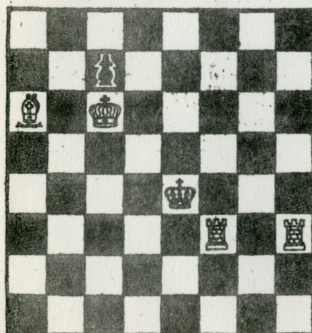

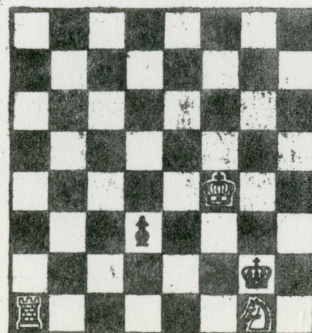

White to play and mate in three moves.

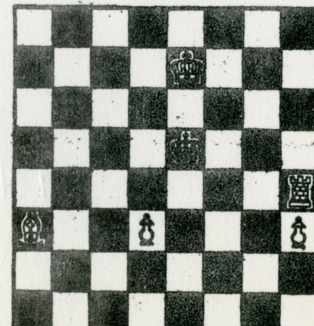
