Having been called by one-fifth of the entire membership as required by Article VII, Section 3, of the constitution of this club, a special meeting of the Oakland Central YMCA Chess Club was held on Friday, July 23, 1965, in the Banquet Room of the Oakland Central YMCA.

The meeting was called to order at 8:02 p.m. by the Secretary, who retained the chair by general consent (the President being absent). Mr. Morrison acted as secretary.

The chairman explained the reason for the meeting and told of his conference with Mr. Miller, Program Director of the Oakland Central YMCA, regarding this club's future use of the YMCA's facilities. Mr. Gaylor then told the club of the Leamington Hotel's offer to use its facilities for meeting of this club. A question and answer period followed.

It was moved by Mr. McCollough and seconded by Mr. Gaylor and discussed that we not under any circumstances turn over the club treasury to the YMCA. After discussion the motion was carried.

The adoption of the following resolution was moved by Mr. Gaylor, seconded by Mr. McCollough, and discussed:

Resolved, That the Oakland Central YMCA Chess Club, in view of the proposed increase in the YMCA social membership fee, take steps to find new and suitable quarters for our regular Friday night meetings and at that time to change the name of the club.

After a voice vote, Mr. Trenberth called for a count, and it was taken by general consent, the resolution thus being adopted by a vote of 15-0.

At this point the President arrived and assumed the chair.

The adoption of the following resolution was moved by Mr. Gaylor, seconded by Mr. Rosen and discussed:

Resolved, That the members of the Oakland Central YMCA Chess Club, who as individuals or as members of a family, restrict their contributions to the Community Chest, to this extent, that such contributions be made with the proviso that "no portion is to be allocated to the YMCA or its subsidiaries."

Mr. McCollough moved to lay the question on the table, and Mr. Dobin seconded the motion. Mr. Morrison called for a count, and it was taken by general consent, the resolution thus being tabled by a vote of 9-1.

It was moved by Mr. McCollough and seconded by Mr. Blodgett that the chairman appoint a committee of three to investigate possible meeting sites as per the resolution, and that it report back to the club. It was moved by Mr. Meyers, and

seconded by Mr. Morrison, and discussed to amend the motion by striking out "the chairman appoint a committee of three" and inserting "the Board of Directors and Mr. Gaylor be a special committee." Mr. McCollough moved that he be granted leave to withdraw his motion, but there was no second. The previous question was moved by Mr. Gaylor and seconded by Mr. Quinlivan. The motion was carried.

It was moved by Mr. Gaylor and seconded by Mr. McCollough that the club applaud the Board of Directors. There was some applause, but no vote was taken.

The club then approved Mr. McCollough's motion with Mr. Meyers amendment; that the Board of Directors and Mr. Gaylor be a special committee to investigate possible meeting sites as per the resolution and that it report back to the club.

It was moved by Mr. McCollough and seconded by Mr. Morrison that when the meeting adjourned, it adjourn to three weeks hence. The motion was carried.

The adoption of the following resolution was moved by Mr. Rosen and ruled out of order by the President:

Committee's Report

The special committee to which was referred the matter of investigating possible meeting sites as per the resolution passed by the club submits the following partial report.

The following agencies do not have facilities for our club meetings at all:

- (1) Hotel Coit-Ramsey
- (2) St. Mark Hotel

The following agencies have facilities which are not available every Friday night:

(1) The Park Department has its San Antonio Park at Foothill Boulevard between 16th and 18th Streets and its Brookdale Park at 1901 East 19th Street, both with a capacity of approximately fifty. The fee is \$4 per hour, or, for five hours per evening, \$1300 per year. Both are available from 5 p.m.-11:30 p.m. on all Fridays except

the third Friday of the month. (Source: Perennial Reservations)

(2) Danish Hall at 164 11th Street has an Upper Hall for fifty persons and a Lower Hall for more. The fee for the Upper Hall is \$15 per evening (\$380 per year) and is available from 7 p.m.-11 p.m. on the second Monday and second Tuesday of the month. The fee for the Lower Hall is \$15 per evening or \$60 per month (\$720 per year) as is available Mondays and Thursdays.

(3) The Oakland Library Department has its Main Library Auditorium at 145 14th Street, its Temescal Branch at 52nd Street and Telegraph Avenue, and its Lakeview Branch at 500 El Embarcadero. The fee for the Main Library Auditorium, which seats 200, is \$500 per year. The fee for the branch libraries, which seat about thirty, is \$300 per year. None are available on Friday night. Tables are not supplied at the branch libraries. (Source: Finance Department)

(4) The Oakland Central YMCA at 2101 Telegraph Avenue has its Banquet Room on the first floor. The fee (on a non-affiliated basis) is \$10 per evening, or \$520 per year. The room closes at 12 p.m. A larger room, the Rose Room, is available for tournaments and seats 100. The fee is \$25 per day. The club would control its own treasury, but could not use the YMCA's name in its title. There are chances of preemption by affiliated and physical education groups. (Source: Mr. Miller)

The following agencies have facilities available every Friday of the year at a fee of from \$300 to \$2600:

(1) The Oakland Auditorium at 10 10th Street has a ballroom on the third floor and a banquet room on the ground floor which would seat 100 for chess. The fee is \$35 per evening to 12 p.m. (\$1800 per year) and \$50 per evening to 1 a.m. (\$2600 per year). (Source: Mr. Goth)

(2) Kaiser Center, Incorporated at 300 Lakeside Drive has its Lakeside Room which seats twenty-five and its California Room which seats thirty to fifty. The fee is \$20 per evening (\$1040 per year) and \$40 per evening (\$2080 per year) respectively. The rooms should close at 10 p.m., and there are additional charges for later hours because of trouble with the parking lot. These are banquet rooms primarily for catering and are not exactly suitable for our use. A bridge club had problems there. (Source: Dolly Black)

(3) The Oakland Recreation Department has its Municipal Boat House at 563 Bellevue Street with seats for 200. The fee is \$5 per hour, or, for five hours per evening, \$1300 per year.

The following agencies have facilities available every Friday night free of charge:

(1) The Oakland Board of Education has a cafeteria at Lakeview Elementary School, 743 Grand Avenue; a teachers' lunch room at Lincoln Elementary School, 255 11th Street; Room 19 (a small auditorium) at McChesney Junior High School, 3743 13th Avenue; and Room 105 (a teachers' cafeteria) at Oakland High School, Park Boulevard and MacArthur Boulevard. The room is available from 6 p.m. to 11:30 p.m. Smoking is permitted, but the club can collect dues of no more than \$3 per year, outside of the school.

(2) Leamington Hotel has a room available, plus a locker, and a larger room for tournaments. In return for the use of their facilities we would have to give them publicity and hold a number of tournaments.
