Grades 1-9. Registration 9:00-10:00 AM. First and second place will qualify to play in the Orange County Scholastic Championship.

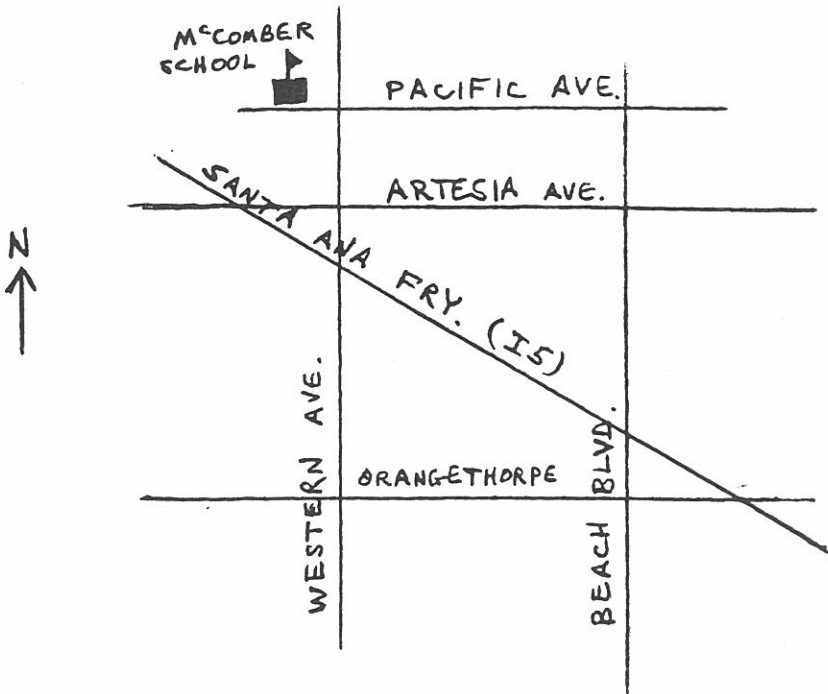

With this issue we begin a series of articles on chess notation.

PART I - The Descriptive System

Over the long history of chess several systems of chess notation have been developed. Of these systems only two are in wide-spread use: the descriptive system and the algebraic system. The first of these systems that will be examined is the descriptive system. Although it is gradually being replaced by the algebraic system the descriptive system is still being used in the United States. In addition, a large amount of literature is available only in descriptive notation.

As its name implies this system is basically a description of the moves made on a chessboard. Originally the system described the moves in words only, with no abbreviations. For example, in one early book the first two moves of a game were written:

1

WHITE The King's Pawn two steps
BLACK The same

2

W. The King's Knight at his Bishop's third Square
B. The Queen's Pawn one Move

Over the years writers began to abbreviate more and more. Gradually the modern descriptive system was developed. The above moves in the modern descriptive system

would be written as follows:

	WHITE	BLACK
1	P-K4	P-K4
2	N-KB3	P-Q3

As you can see the move is described by giving the piece moved followed by a hyphen followed by the square to which the piece is moved. The squares are identified by the file and the rank.

The files are the "up and down" rows of squares running from the edge of the board in front of one player to the edge in front of the other. The files are named after the pieces that occupy the files at the start of the game. Sometimes, in order to avoid confusion, the files are also identified as being on the "King's side" or the "Queen's side" by adding the letter "K" or "Q" to the description.

The ranks are the rows of squares that run from one side of the board to the other. The ranks are numbered from 1 to 8. When describing a move by White the ranks are counted from the White side of the board. When describing a move by Black the count starts on the Black side of the board.

So, each square is identified by a symbol which combines the initials of the file's name with the number of the rank. The number of the rank will depend upon whether it is a White move or a Black move that is described. In other words, each square has two names depending upon whether it is viewed from White's side or Black's side of the chessboard.

The symbols used to describe the files are the same symbols used to describe the pieces. They are:

P for the PAWN
R for the ROOK

N or sometimes Kt for the KNIGHT
 B for the BISHOP
 K for the KING
 Q for the QUEEN

The symbols for the squares (for both White and Black) are shown on diagram one.

As previously stated, sometimes a Q or a K is added to the square's symbol. This is done, for example, to avoid confusion when a piece can move to more than one square with the same symbol. In the example given earlier White's second move is written 2 N-KB3 (instead of 2 N-B3) because there are two possible Knight moves (the other is 2 N-QB3). These symbols are shown on diagram two.

Captures are shown by giving the symbol of the piece making the capture followed by an "x" followed by the symbol of the piece being captured (for example NxP). If several captures are possible the move can be made more clear by giving more information about the piece making the capture (for example KNxP or N/B3xP) or the piece being captured (NxBP or NxP/B3). If a pawn is making a capture en passant the capture is followed by "e.p." to show this (PxPe.p.).

Castling on the King's side is indicated by the symbol "0-0". Castling on the Queen's side is shown by "0-0-0".

Checks are shown in several ways. The most common are by the symbols "ch" or "+".

In books and magazines chess games may be printed out in columns or paragraphs. As an exercise, set up your chessboard and play over the following game. If you have any problems refer to the diagrams given in this article.
