After years of fruitless endeavor and agitation among chess clubs and individuals by altruistic enthusiasts in these United States, at last, thanks to a group of Chicago devotees of Caissa, and especially to Samuel D. Factor, the National Chess Federation has been formed. To date, twenty-three chess clubs have affiliated and if no other club gets in ahead of the Mechanics' Institute of San Francisco, the local club will become Chapter 24. Los Angeles Chess and Checkers Club was twenty-third on the roster. Officers of the N. C. F. are Maurice S. Kuhns, Chicago, president; Alrick H. Man, New York,; Leander J. McCormick, Chicago; J. E. Dittus, Chicago; Howard S. Hoit, New York, vice-presidents; Harry S. Heick, Chicago, treasurer; Samuel D. Factor, Chicago, secretary; A. J. Quigley, C. P. A., Chicago, auditor.

Among other purposes of the new organization are to encourage formation of new clubs; development of individual players and arranging annual tourmanents for amateurs, as well as experts, etc. The Western Chess Association, which for over a quarter of a century had conducted an annual Western championship tournament, has merged with and formed a nucleus for the new National Chess Federation.

It is too early to make any definite announcement, but at least it may be stated that negotiations have been under way for some time looking to a national tournament for San Francisco.


