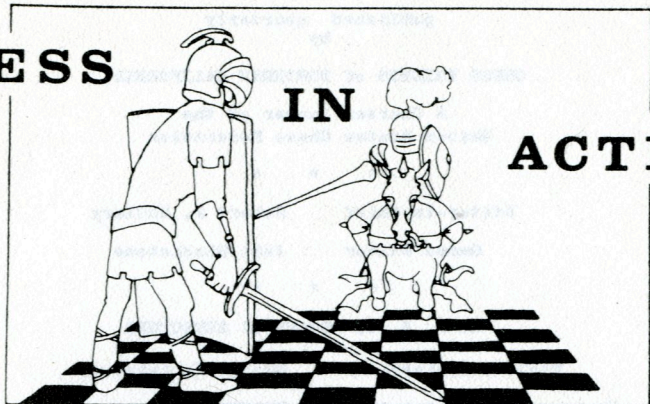

**EQUIPMENT** All players are requested to bring boards, pieces & chess clocks. All entrants will receive an established rating.

**ACCOMMODATIONS** For those wishing to stay overnight, the YMCA has excellent rooms available.

**SPECIAL NOTICE** There will be a "Sunday Special" round-robin tournament on Sunday, June 20, for those who cannot participate in the two-day event. This event starts at 10:00 A.M., with sign-ups accepted until noon. The entry fee is \$2.00, plus membership in CFNC. A prize will be awarded to the winner of each 4-player group.

Do you remember Hastings 1953, when Alexander beat Bronstein after 120 moves and three days' intermittent play, when chess hit the headlines of the English press, when Bronstein had to win -- and won by sheer magic -- a last-round losing game, so as to share first prize with Alexander?

But, do you also remember that the brilliancy prize of this Hastings tournament was won by an 18-year-old youngster from Iceland (he turned 19 a few days after the event) by the name of Fridrik Olafsson? The F.I.D.E. made him an International Master in 1956. He is now one of the prominent grandmasters, with many tournament successes and treacherant games to his credit. But, my Olafsson-favorite is still this Hastings game -- and here it is:

Wade -- Olafsson

KING'S INDIAN DEFENSE

Hastings, 1953

- 1. P-Q4 N-KB3
- 2. P-QB4 P-KN3
- 3. N-QB3 B-N2
- 4. P-K4 O-O
- 5. B-K3 ....

Too optimistic. Sounder is N-K1, so the Knight can be used defensively.

- 17. .... N-N5
- 18. B-Q1 N-KB3
- 19. P-KN4 ....

If instead 5.P-K5, N-K1; the White Pawn-center can be demolished by ... P-Q3 and ... P-QB4 (possibly also ... P-KB3), as Fischer - for instance - has demonstrated.

At long last he has managed this, but now Black is ready first.

- 19. .... P-B3

- 5. .... P-Q3
- 6. P-KR3 ....

Now the fun starts, e.g. 20.PxP, BxP; 21.QxP, NxKP.

- 20. P-N5 KNxQP

One hardly ever sees this in modern practice. It was propagated by Grunfeld in the twenties, and certainly has its points, if followed up logically.

- 6. .... P-K4
- 7. P-Q5 QN-Q2
- 8. B-Q3 ....

And now we enter the witches' cauldron. It was impossible, of course, for Olafsson (or anybody else, for that matter) to calculate the effect of this sacrifice to the end -- which, incidentally, will come only after another 20 moves. However, the conception is based upon sound premises: lines are opened against a denuded Black King, and something good is bound to arise from the subsequent play. As I see it, only the line 21.KPxN, PxP; 22.PxP, P-K5; 23.B-Q4, P-K6; 24.PxP, NxP+ (and wins) required to be really calculated.

- 8. .... N-KR4
- 9. P-KN3 ....

- 21. NxN NxN
- 22. KPxN PxP
- 23. QxP ....

But this is not logical, and 8.P-KN4 should have been played. From here, I get the impression that Wade is vacillating between various opening systems. Hence, he must (and will) obtain a difficult game.

- 9. .... N-B4
- 10. B-B2 P-QR4
- 11. Q-K2 B-Q2
- 12. O-O-O P-R5

Trying to lessen the onslaught by offering the exchange. But who wants to give up a good Bishop for a bad Rook? The alternative is 23.Q-B2, when Black has two attractive continuations in: (A) 23...P-Q5; 24.B-Q2, P-K5; and (B) 23...Q-N1; 24.K-N1, R-QB1; of which two, I personally favor the last.

And why not here (and again on his 11th move) KN-K2 -- ?

- 13. N-B3 Q-B1
- 14. QR-N1 ....

- 23. .... P-QN4
- 24. B-B3 P-K5

Quite right. An attack on the White King is prepared, prior to the opening of lines.

Now the K-Bishop also participates in the attack. This is worth another Pawn.

- 14. .... P-R6
- 15. P-N3 N-R3
- 16. Q-Q2 R-K1
- 17. N-R4 ....

- 25. BxP R-R3
- 26. Q-N7 RxB

Black need not accept the offered Pawn, for after 14...BxP; 15.N-N5, B-N5; 16.P-B3, the White attack might develop first.

This increases Black's investment to a whole Rook, but all his remaining pieces are bearing on the White King, and there are enough of them left to

do the job. Should White refuse offer, then the "end-game" arising from 27.QxQ, BxQ; 28.PxP, R-R4; 29. N-B3, RxP; 30.N-Q2, R-K2; will be all in Black's favor, as the White King will still be in trouble.

27. QxR PxP  
28. P-N4 B-N7+  
29. K-N1 P-Q4

The real point of this new sacrifice becomes evident on Black's next move. It was recommended at the time that White should have refused the offer and answered 30.Q-B4, but even then Black's winning advantage can be demonstrated, e.g. 30...R-K3; (suggested by Kieninger in Caissa as "very strong"). The point is that Black threatens 31...R-K5 and 32...RxN; with ...B-B4 Mate, to follow. If 31.P-B3, then 31...RxB, 32.R-K1, (what else?), P-B6; winning. I had the most trouble with 31.B-B1 (trying laudably to remove the reprehensible Bishop), until I hit on 31...R-K5; 32.Q-N3, R-K8; 33.Q-B3, P-B6; 34.Q-Q3, B-R5; and White can safely resign. If 32.Q-B3, then 32...P-B6; 33.BxB, RPxB; leaves White without further defense.

30. QxQP R-Q3

If 31.QxR, then 31...B-B4+ spells MATE.

31. Q-K4 P-B6  
32. R-QB1 ....

Offering again a "bad" Rook for a good Bishop. If instead 32.R-Q1, then ...B-R5; which forces 33.R-QB1, and we go into the actual continuation.

32. .... B-B3  
33. Q-QB4 ....

If instead 33.Q-KB4, then 33...Q-K3; with the threats ...B-Q4 and ...B-K5+ (depending upon White's reply), while if 33.Q-B2, BxR; 34.RxB, R-Q7, etc.

33. .... Q-N2  
34. P-B3 B-N4  
35. Q-B4 B-Q6+  
36. R-B2 Q-Q4  
37. R-R2 ....

If 37.Q-R2, QxP+; 38.KxQ, B-B5+, 39.K-N1, P-R7 Mate.

37. .... B-B5  
38. RxB RPxR

The alternative 38...Q-Q8+ leads to the same finale as the text move.

39. RxP Q-Q8+  
40. B-B1 B-Q6+  
WHITE RESIGNS.

Mate in three cannot be avoided.

#### SMAIL WINS KOLTY INVITATIONAL

JOHN SMAIL (Berkeley) shot through his opposition like grease through a tin horn, winning the 1965 Kolty Invitational Tournament with an 8-1 score. His only loss was to DENNIS SACCUZZO (San Francisco), who finished clear second with 6½-2½. STAN JOHNSON (Los Gatos) and R.P. McCLARY (San Francisco) tied for third & fourth with 6-3 scores. In winning, Smail took home \$150 in prize money, with Saccuzzo receiving \$75 for second place. Johnson and McClary split \$80 for their tie, and cash awards went as deep as tenth or twelfth place (we do not have the complete breakdown of prize awards, or any game scores.) A similar tournament is planned for the near future, although no definite information is yet available.

## KANAMORI, VAYSSIE and HARRIS WIN AT WALNUT CREEK

16-year-old AKI KANAMORI (San Francisco) continued his winning ways by finishing a clear first ( $4\frac{1}{2}-\frac{1}{2}$ ) in the Expert/A Division in this year's WALNUT CREEK OPEN TOURNAMENT. Second was WALTER DORNE (San Francisco) with 4-1, and in third place was BILL CAPLAN (Burlingame) with  $3\frac{1}{2}-1\frac{1}{2}$ . Five players tied for 4th-through-8th places with 3-2 scores.

In Class B, San Francisco fireman PAUL VAYSSIE burned his way through all opponents to win the trophy with a perfect 5-0. GARY PICKLER (Danville), EVERETT McNALLY (Hayward) and ALLEN GOLBERT (Alameda) tied for 2nd, 3rd and 4th places with 4-1.

DONALD HARRIS (Los Gatos), a foreign languages teacher at Saratoga High School, also swept over his opposition to win the Class C title with 5-0. BRUCE NORRIS (St. Mary's) finished 2nd with  $4\frac{1}{2}-\frac{1}{2}$ , and JAMES JEE (Berkeley) and BRUCE ROSEN (Alameda) tied for 3rd and 4th with 4-1 scores.

## 5-WAY TIE FOR FIRST AT MONTEREY

74 players from all over California made the 2nd ANNUAL MONTEREY OPEN a fine success. The three top prizes were won by five players who all scored  $4\frac{1}{2}-\frac{1}{2}$ . They were: EARL PRUNER (San Francisco), PHILIP SMITH (Fresno), KOIT TULLUS (San Jose), R.M. JACOBS (Santa Monica) and ROY HOPPE (Novato). The Expert Prize was shared by DAVID BLOHM (San Francisco) and ERIK OSBUN (San Jose), with 4-1 scores. Class A was won by IRA POHL (Stanford), also with 4-1. HAROLD EDELSTEIN (San Carlos) took the Class B prize with another 4-1. JIM CORNWELL (San Francisco) and PETER LAMASNEY (Palo Alto) scored 3-2 to share the Class C prize. Top Unrated player was ERIK SWANSON (Berkeley), with yet another 4-1. Games from this event appear elsewhere in this issue.

This was the first Open held at the Berkeley YMCA, and it attracted 90 players. Finishing 2nd was PAUL VAYSSIE (San Francisco) with 4-1. JOHN SMAIL, winner of the recently completed Kolyt Invitational Tournament in Berkeley tied Sloan for 3rd and 4th with  $3\frac{1}{2}-1\frac{1}{2}$ . After them came DENNIS SACCUZZO (San Francisco), ROBERT MITCHELL (Klamath Falls, Ore.), ROY McCOLLOUGH (Oakland) and PAUL CULOTTA of San Francisco, with 3-2.

The B Division was won outright by T. MAKENS (Oakland) with 5-0. Tied for 2nd, 3rd and 4th places were SANDY STERNLIEB (San Francisco), F. McNALLY (Hayward) and ROBERT CLIPSON (Concord) with 4-1.

In Class C, W. KNIGHT (Albany) took clear first with  $4\frac{1}{2}-\frac{1}{2}$ . JOHN NOTOR (San Leandro), NORMAN WILD (San Jose), PAUL MAYER (Saratoga) and PHIL DEL MONTE (Oakland) followed him with 4-1 scores.

In the "Sunday Special" round robins, prizes were won by G. WEBER (Alameda), F. PUST (Santa Clara) and DAVE MEADOR (Oakland).

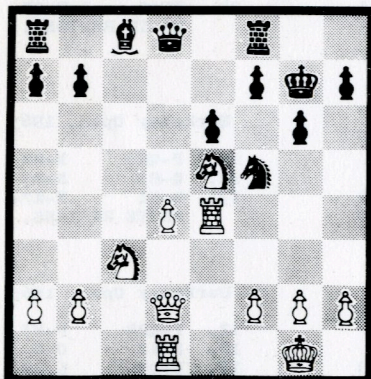

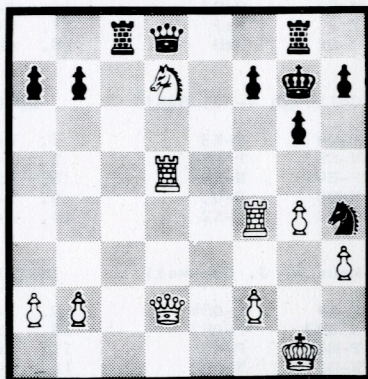

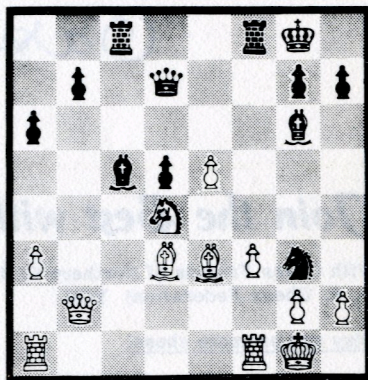
