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Robert Henderson came from behind to defeat Marshall McLennan by a score of 6-4 in a ten game USCF-rated match, played in April and May. McLennan took an early 4-1 lead as Henderson experienced some difficulty with the Black side of the Morra Gambit whenever he played the Sicilian Defense. With his back to the wall, Bob played steady chess to sweep the last five games, winning the match. With the White pieces, McLennan ventured the Morra Gambit five straight times against Henderson's Sicilian; Marsh winning the first three before his opponent zeroed in on the line to take the last two. In his five games as first player, Henderson won two Reti Openings, split a pair (with the Ruy Lopez) against the Marshall Attack, and defeated McLennan's Philidor Defense one time.

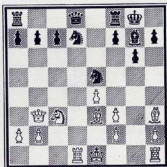

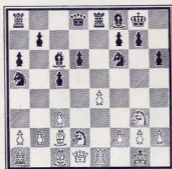

With the White pieces, Vayssie lost two Giuoco Pianos and a Danish Gambit, but won a Vienna Game and a King's Gambit.

It hath had with me a fascinating property; I have been bewitched by it: When I have begun, I have not had the power to give over.

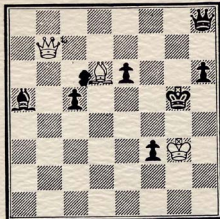

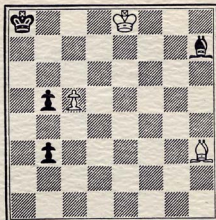
