

SAMUEL RESHEVSKY Defeats Soviet Chess Ace

Russians Lead In Chess Match

MOSCOW, July 2 .- The Russian team holds a five to two lead over the Americans in the Soviet-U. S. International Chess Tournament being played here.

. The Americans gained a point on the Russians today when the Soviet World Champion Mikhail Botvinnik resigned the first-round adjourned game to the top-ranking American player, Samuel Reshevsky

Only the game between Mark Taimanov of Russia and the American Kashdan remains to be completed to end the first round of play.

The second round game between Botvinnik and Reshevsky resulted in a draw.

The encounter between the two great teams of the two most powerful countries had produced much excitement in Moscow. News reports had it that Reshevsky was mobbed by 1000 admirers after the first game with Botvinnik seeking autographs.

The match consists of four rounds, 32 games in all, It is due to be finished about July 7, with time out for adjourned games, recreation, and presumably, a touch of vodka.


