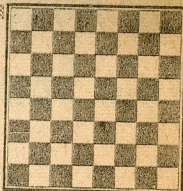

(a) The "modern" treatment, aiming at P-K4, as opposed to the "stonewall" system, which keeps White's K4 under closer observation but establishes a more rigid pawn barrier.

(b) Slightly inferior to the regular 7N-B3.

(c) White plays directly for P-K4, his strongest line

(d) Although this move does not really prevent White's break in the center, it is Black's best continuation.

(e) Unnecessary preparation, viz., 9 P-K4 PxP 10 NxP NxN 11 RxN! (Aronson — Tal, XXIV USSR Championship, 1957). If now 11 . . . QxR?, then Black gets his Queen trapped after 12 N-R4.

(f) Playing 10 P-QR3 first allows 10 . . . P-K4, but the text-move forfeits a Pawn.

(g) Or 13 QxP N-B7!, winning the exchange.

(h) Moving the KR stops the brilliancy, but still leaves Black with an overwhelming position.

(i) A stunning, beautifully conceived sacrifice.

(j) Relatively best, though also insufficient, is 15 QxN P-K6! 16 Q-Q1 PxPch 17 K-RI PxR/Qch 18 QxQ.

(k) Throws another piece away and further opens the game to Black's advantage. Of course 18 R-K1 Q-B4 19 R-B1 B-K7 holds out no hope either.

(1) "Best" under the circumstances.
