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## BUENOS AIRES, 1970

Robert Fischer's recent tournament successes seem to have paved the way for an even more impressive victory in Buenos Aires. Without losing a single game out of 17 rounds, Fischer outpaced his closest rival by the unusually wide margin of 3½ points.

Eleven of the 18 participants in the strong international event held the grandmaster rank, while second-place Vladimir Tukmakov actually achieved a grandmaster result. In fact, had Fischer not won the contest so convincingly, young Tukmakov would have stolen the show with his remarkable display of strength, since he is relatively unknown outside the Soviet Union and does not yet possess an international title.

Although he was defeated brilliantly by both Fischer and Tukmakov, Argentine grandmaster Oscar Panno gave an excellent account of himself to finish third.
