THE PEASE SYSTEM.....MORE

A couple of issues back, we published a suggestion by Ronald PEASE regarding an improved system of pairing adjourned games in a Swiss tournament. Mr. Martin MORRISON, well-known columnist and editor of "Scacchic Voice" of Northern California (or Central, depending where you draw the line for Oakland) has an interesting comment:

"I read with interest Mr. PEASE's recommendations for pairing players with adjourned games. The system he proposes is in some ways similar to that of the British Chess Federation, which is probably unfamiliar to the majority of your readers. The seventh rule for BCF Swiss System Tournaments reads in part: 'For the purpose of making a draw (pairing) for the next round, provisional adjudications of unfinished games are best classified as follows: Probable Win (1), Probable Draw (½), Probable Loss (0), Possible Win (1-), Possible Draw (½-). This often enables players with unfinished games to be used as floaters (odd men in the same score group to be transferred to another score group).'

"Both the PEASE and the BCF systems recognize a category between 0 and ½ and between ½ and 1, but whereas the PEASE system uses the player's evaluation of his own game as a basis for temporary adjudication, the BCF system attempts a refinement of an objective evaluation. Perhaps we tournament directors, with the cooperation of the players, could test both Mr. PEASE's suggestion and that of our British congeners."

Yes indeed. We'll try it - or them - soon. Seems to us the BCF system has one drawback - it presumes that the T.D. has both the time and the ability to make a judgment on an adjourned position. Or (s). Time is probably more of a problem, especially in a large turnout - with an hour or so to make pairings for 200 players, very little time is left for adjudication of any games for pairing purposes. As far as ability, we'd hate to rule on a game of ADDISON v. BROWNE where both players state they are playing for a win. Guess a combination of both methods would be best - where the T.D.'s adjudication would be more of a verification of a player's own assessment than a start-from-scratch adjudication. Anyway, our thanks to Martin MORRISON for his comments.

SO. CALIF. CHESS LEAGUE TO MONITOR CLUB TOURNAMENTS?

Among several issues discussed at the last SCCL meeting, held at the Atlas Chess Club on Jan. 19, considerable time was given toward establishing some system whereby individual tournaments at various clubs would be promptly reported to the USCF for rating. Instances were cited where rating reports were not sent in in a reasonable time, and subsequent inquiries on the players' part were not successful. To remedy the situation, it was motioned that the League "step in" and set up a system whereby all memberclubs would channel their tournament notices and rating reports through a League representative. This way the League would monitor activities and get after T.D.'s and clubs if they get lax in their post-operative duties.

After lengthy discussion, the issue was handed to a committee for further study and liaison with clubs. The problem involved naturally is the old question of how much authority the League should have over clubs. Such policing action is not within the realm of the League, but if all clubs wish to impose such authority on the SCCL it might be merited.

In other happenings, the annual elections brought some new blood into the SCCL in electing Ronald PEASE as Tournament Director. A new post, though "old" blood, went to Hank SHIPIN who was Asst. T.D. last year - that of Treasurer, a position opened up after Larry HOKE decided to call it quits after several years at the financial helm. Officers re-elected were Benton JAMES, Vice-President, Doug LINN, Secretary, and your editor as President. The Asst. T.D.'ship was not filled; instead, PEASE may appoint helpers - most likely John BARNARD and Dave ARGALL.

Benton started up with the original Tournament Club on Western, establishing a well-known address for localites in a short time. He ran several experimental events, such as the famous computer-run Guinea Pig Tourney, and was always ready with a new idea to make chess more popular and exciting. He moved to new premises (the present Atlas Club) which later became headquarters for the League, and in which many top tournaments have been held. Mr. JAMES established the So. Calif. Championships as a standard class tourney, and recently took over the West Coast and L.A. County Opens. Mr. JAMES retired at the end of last year, but his club continues to function - every day of the week. Welcome, and congratulations, Benton!

PASSING OF AN ERA

Time may be a healer, but it sure is an upsetter before it heals. It is with heavy heart indeed, that we have to report the demise of a chess club which has become a household name to all southlanders: The City Terrace Chess Club. At the beginning of the year, the club has officially closed down due to lack of support and organization.

City Terrace was formed many years ago by the amicable Bernard OAK, who quickly built it into the top club in the eastern area and one of the top clubs in the southland. It became site of many great tournaments, such as the Eastside Opens and the famed CATS Tournaments. Simul exhibitions by great names like GLIGORIC, LARSEN, RESHEVSKY were the order of the day. The club's showing in the SCCL Team Matches was always formidable. But, through time, and with OAK gone, there was a lack of the local core of members that form the nucleus of a club. It became a facility for players from other clubs who wanted to play on Wed. nights.

A few old-timers tried to keep it going but failed. Attendance fell off to practically zero in the latter half of 1970. The sad decision had to be made, and the club was dibanded January 6.

Our hats off for a once fine club. We can state with pleasure, however, that one thing will remain as a club memento for quite a while: TERRACHESS, originally composed of "Terrace Chess" will retain its name. But every time we draw our little circles, we'll think of the club that gave us our start in Los Angeles.....
