Walt CUNNINGHAM of Arcadia, playing for the U.S. Student Team at Budva, Yugoslavia, tells us the U.S. team placed first in one of the five preliminary sections, scoring 9½-2½, ahead of Poland, 8-4. Top two teams in each section qualify into the finals.

The U.S. team defeated Finland, 4-0; Tunisia, 3-1; Poland, 2½-1½. Other countries to qualify are U.S.S.R, Yugoslavia, Holland, Mongolia, Hungary, Italy, Czechoslovakia and Bulgaria. Walt didn't tell us his individual performance results, but we do know that he won his game against Poland.....

The world champion was again facing the only man who had defeated him. He showed early that he was out for revenge. With the advance of the pawns in front of his king, PETROSIAN launched a determined attack. 17 P-K5 was a far-sighted thrust that meant serious trouble for the black side. If then PxB, 18 P-B5 would quickly open the lines in PETROSIAN's favor. GLIGORIC sacrificed a knight for two pawns to break up the immediate threats - but there was not enough compensation.
