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#### NORTH AGAIN CHAMPIONS, 21-18

The North gained a decisive margin on its bottom boards, winning 7 out of 11 and drawing 4, and thus retained the team championship of the State at the annual Memorial Day event in Fresno.

The team match was held at the Hacienda Motel in Fresno on May 30, It was preceded by the California Rapid-Transit Championship and followed by the special 30-30 Tournament. Duncan Suttles of Reno (and Canada) won both events (but in the North-South match lost his game on Board One to Irving Rivise).

The annual meeting of the California State Chess Federation was held on Sunday afternoon after the match instead of the usual Saturday night.

#### STATISTICAL REPORT by E.C. Jonas

The 1965 Northern California vs. Southern California team match was the 32nd in a series started in 1926. This year's match was 39 boards. Of the total of 39 games played, 17 were won by White, 12 by Black, and 10 were drawn.

The South has won 8 times, the North now 2l times, and there have been 3 ties. A total of 1309 games have been played during this period (not counting a 20-board match between the "second" teams in 1947, won by the North  $10\frac{1}{2}-9\frac{1}{2}$ ). Total score: North  $715\frac{1}{2}$  - South  $593\frac{1}{2}$ .

Over the years the North has used a total of 305 players, while the South has used 441. There have been 39 players who have played at various times for both North and South. Previous results:

#### ANNUAL MEETING - CALIFORNIA STATE CHESS FEDERATION

The annual meeting of the CSCF was held on Sunday afternoon following the North-South team match, rather than on Saturday night. White it was party expediency which set the time for meeting, it turned out to be better in some ways than the usual time. The late-hour meetings of the past usually resulted in too much oration and a certain amount of bickering. This time, only those persons with business to attend to stayed after the match for the meeting. The various reports were dealt with and the business of the coming year was organized with efficiency.

Besides the reports and the adoption of the coming year's tournament calendar, the main business was the election of directors. The following were elected: H. D. Rader, Gordon Barrett, Guthrie McClain, Dr. Allen Hendy, Irving Rivise, Michael Goodall and Gunnar Rasmussen (three directors are to be appointed by the President). The directors

reelected Isaac Kashdan as president and Dr. Ralph Hultgren as treasurer and elected Russell Freeman as vice-president and Kyle Forrest as secretary. Gordon Barrett remains as chairman of the Board of Directors.

#### DUNCAN SUTTLES CALIFORNIA SPEED CHAMPION

Duncan Suttlew of Reno (and Canada) won the annual California rapid-transit title at Fresno. Suttles scored  $5\frac{1}{2}-1\frac{1}{2}$  in the finals. Bill Maillard was second with 5-2 and Sven Almgren was third,  $4\frac{1}{2}-2\frac{1}{2}$ . Eight finalists qualified from two sections of 11 players each. The finalists: Section A: W. Maillard, D. Suttles, G. Barrett, M. Wilkerson. Section B: E. Pruner, S. Almgren, R. Larsen, K. Stani. The defending champion, Allan Troy, did not participate.

#### DUNCAN SUTTLES WINS 30-30 TOURNAMENT By Gordon S. Barrett

In answer to the numerous requests by many players to organize something in addition to the North-South match, based on the premise that "why go all that way for one game," the California State Chess Federation staged this event to fill the gap. Thirty-two players entered and had a real good tournament; but, in your editor's opinion anyway, the event either did not fulfill peoples' dreams, or the basic premise was wrong - in any case, the weekend did not draw a greater number of people on account of this tourney. There were those who normally don't go to Fresno because of the "one game only" factor? The prizewinners: Suttles, \$100; Larsen \$50; Expert, Almgren, Manney, Stani \$10 each; Class A, Gates and Stearns, \$15 each; Class B, Stobbe \$25; Class C, Fotias \$20. The event was directed by Gordon Barrett.

#### COMPUTERIZED TOURNAMENT SPREADS CONFUSION

A new system using a computer was tried at the Tournament Club (of Benton James, 3554 S. Western Avenue, Los Angeles) in June. The results were at variance with the conventional scores. Jose Tossas was first place with a .94 computer points, ahead of Irving Rivise, .89, and Bill Maillard, .88. Tossas scored 5-1, Rivise 5-1, and Maillard  $5\frac{1}{2}-\frac{1}{2}$  (!). H. Kolin, who made a 5-1 score, finished 18th.

The pairings were quite different from the usual Swiss System. In the first roung, the top half did not play the bottom half. In the second round, winners sometimes played losers. According to tournament director Gordon Barrett, the main difficulty with the new system was that the players did not know where they stood during the tournament and never knew whether to play for a win or a draw, based on their score. The computer program was designed by Dave Rothman.

There is a situation in the Japanese game of Go which is called a "Cherry Tree Ko." It either means (a) the position is so satisfactory that the player can leave the game without any qualms and go outside and gaze upon the cherry tree, or (b) it is as beautiful as a cherry tree, and he can remain inside and gaze upon the position. Here, White has constant threats on the open file and the back rank, so he can hold the position and take his time in wiping out the defenseless Black pawns. He decides to put the knight out of action first (ED.)



#### TASKS: The A. J. Fink Memorial Problem Composing Tourney, 1965

Adolph J. Fink, 1890-1956, was the epitome of chess in the West, in California, and at the Mechanics' Institute Chess Club for a generation. He won the title of Master in 1922 in a tournament that included Frank Marshall, Isaac Kashdan, Edward Lasker, and Carlos Torre. In 1908 Fink published the first of more than a thousand problems, winning prizes with some 100 of them.

It is only fitting, in conjunction with the 100th Anniversary of the Mechanics' Institute, that a composing tourney be held to commemorate that part of his genius which is perhaps too easily forgotten in current chess fashions. The Mechanics' Institute has proposed a generous prize fund to be awarded at the discretion of the judges in the following categories:



- I. Direct-mate two-movers; Judge; Comins Mansfield.
- II. Direct-mate three-movers; Judge: Walter Jacobs.
- III. Two and three-movers by the same composer, judged as a pair, but not exclusive of the individual categories above; Judge: R.C.O. Matthews.

In addition to cash prizes, certificates will be awarded. A book of all honored problems and names of entrants will be published and sent to all participants. All entries must be on printed diagrams, with full solution, and mailed to R. Burger, 722 Montgomery Street, San Francisco, California, before the end of the year. Diagrams will be recopied without composers' names and forwarded to the judges.
