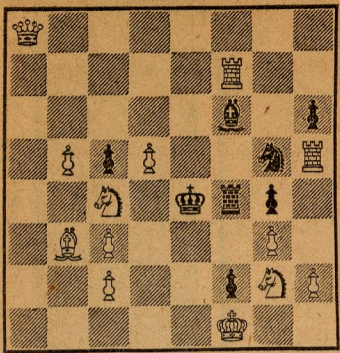


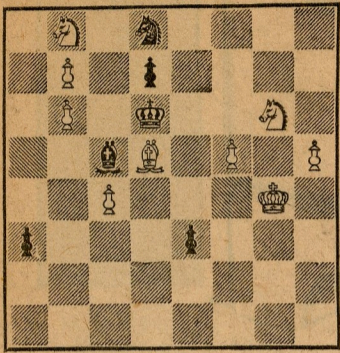

WORLD'S CHAMPIONSHIP CANDIDATES TOURNAMENT

After 21 rounds, the picture of the World's Championship Candidates Tournament now being played in Zurich, Switzerland, is more complicated than ever! The big change came in the 21st round when Alexander Kotov won his game against V. Smyslov, leader of the tournament, thereby allowing U.S. Representative S. Reshevsky to catch up with him.

Closely behind is David Bronstein, who won the 1950 tournament in Budapest and then played a match with Michael Botwinnik which resulted in a tie. One point behind the leaders is Paul Keres, considered the world's best in 1940.

Both Smyslov and Reshevsky have the same conservative style and seldom take chances. While this may win matches, it is more difficult in tournament play. On the other hand, Bronstein and Keres, who are well versed in the tactical aspect of the game, take considerably more chances with the result that they are apt to win more games, have less draws, but also more losses.

Smyslov's loss to Kotov opened a four or five man race for first place. Personally, I believe the chances favor the USSR players, unless Reshevsky changes his strategy in the remaining games, because only by winning can he now hope to come in ahead. The danger of course is that he may also lose, but this is his only hope now for victory.
