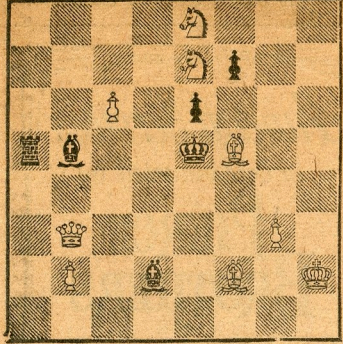

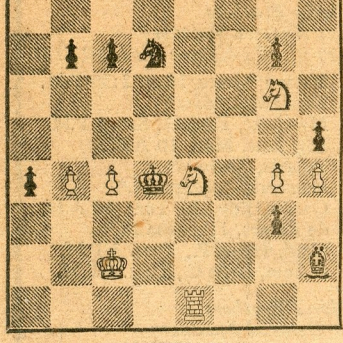

U.S.-RUSSIAN TEAM MATCH

The long-awaited team match between Russia and the United States is tentatively set for July 15 in New York.

The U.S. government has decided to waive provisions of the McCarran-Walter Immigration Act to permit the Soviet team to participate in the tournament.

A State Department spokesman said Atty. Gen. Brownell "has authorized temporary admission" of the team.

RESHEVSKY WINS MATCH

(New York Times)

NEW YORK, July 4—Samuel Reshevsky of New York won his 18-game match with Miguel Najdorf of Buenos Aires this week according to a report from the Argentine capital.

Najdorf won the 18th and last game of the match but Reshevsky, who had clinched the series previously, emerged the match victor by 9 1/2 points to 8 1/2. The U.S. star won six games, lost five and drew seven.

Najdorf, playing white, won in 42 moves in the 16th game.

Reshevsky then added 2 1/2 points to his score by finishing two games that were adjourned and capturing the 17th game.

The much-discussed 13th encounter, recognized by the experts as a "theoretical" draw, was finally admitted to be so by the South American, although he was a knight ahead. Najdorf also conceded the 15th contest which had been adjourned in a position favorable to Reshevsky.

The first match between these two players last year was conducted in New York City, Mexico City and El Salvador and was taken by Reshevsky, 11-7.
