As a rule these games are played to suit the audience, but this game was really seriously fought and Capablanca brought off a spectacular victory. Here is the score of the game :

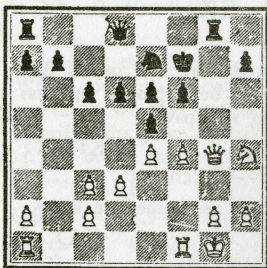
