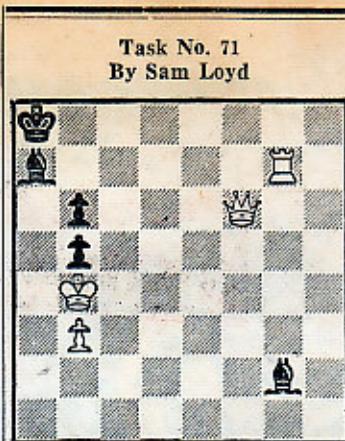
Board fee has been set at \$2. It will be well for players to bring their own sets. Visitors are welcome.

White Mates in Three Moves
(Value five points)

Answer to Task No. 70: The main line is 1 Q-Kt5, P-Kt6; 2 R-QR1 and mate next move.

The "Ritz Special" published in this column last week was composed by the Russian problemist L. I. Kubbel. It was a prize-winner in 1935. We hope you liked it.

The three-move miniature by J.

Drtina, which appeared in this column two weeks ago, proved to be very deceptive. Nine solvers sent in correct solutions, but as many again were fooled, including several of our very best solvers.

The key move is Q-Kt2, with numerous pretty variations.

The solvers were: Vasili Basalaeff, Paul Bercovici, Karl Bopp Jr., R. Ray Brack, Wilber Leeds, Henry M. Newcomb, all of San Francisco; Harry Hokenen, Santa Rosa; Pfc. E. C. Jonas, Fort Ord; Keith Wentz, Alameda.

Interesting Moves

Our old friend, Col. Mulberry Sellers, sends us the following 3-move miniature by Godfrey Heathcote:

White (four men): King on QKt2; Queen on QR8; Bishops on Q4 and QB4. Black (one man): King on K4. White to play and mate in three moves.

The following games are, in our opinion, among the most interesting of modern times. The Estonian grandmaster, Paul Keres, is the victor in the first, played in Stockholm in 1937, and the victim

in the second, played in Switzerland in 1953.
