WHITE MATES IN TWO MOVES  
(Value 4 points)

Answer to Task No. 27: B-R5.

Answer to Task No. 29 should be post-marked not later than September 4. It is required only that White's first move be given.

LAST APRIL the Yugoslav grand-master, Svetozar Gligoric, gave a simultaneous exhibition in San Francisco at the Mechanics' Institute, meeting 37 players. One of his opponents was a young man, 12 years old, named Leal Grupp. Master Grupp is a student at Lowell High School. Gligoric was very happy, no doubt, when young Grupp offered a draw after 23 moves, for he had a very bad game.
