CHESS-SKOOL II
"THE HOLES AFTER P-N3"

By Malcom C. Latham

In fianchettoing a bishop, you create a hole at R3, and also at B3 if you advance the adjacent center pawn. The bishop replaces the pawn in quard duty, so that the potential weakness is covered. The bishop gains a post from which it exerts powerful influence on the center and sometimes on the enemy flank, but if the bishop is swapped off, the hole stands out and is often a pronounced weakness when you've castled on that side . So think twice when swapping off your fianchettoed bishop -- the remaining hole becomes a target for your opponent. Although the fianchettoed bishop quards the holes, it doesn't produce the exact result as a pawn in forbidding their occupation. If a hole is quarded only by a bishop, the opponent need only bring up two pieces to place one of them in the hole. Another hazard of P-N3, it may enable the opponent to open the rook file, (this of course is in front of the castled king) by P-R4-R5. This danger is acute if he has castled on the opposite side you have and his rook stands on it's home square.

The exchange of the rook pawn for a pawn on the adverse (for now let's say King side -- same applies on Queen side) KN3 not only opens the

king rook file but also loosens up the enemy square, KN3.

This year we hope to make the Expert Candidates Tournament a real success. All clubs throughout Southern California are being contacted and many, many players are to compete in this tourney. It will be new and different this year.

A. THE PRELIMINARY SECTIONS: Entirely separate from the finals. Each club will run its own tournament. Four, five, six or seven rounds. They will have their own prizes. The club itself will send in their own table for rating (not to us), and run their own tournament completely. Call it whatever you want: Rating Tournament, XYZ Tourney, whatever. But have one in your club during April, May, and/or June. Then simply send the top 3, 4, or 5 players (whatever you wish, 3-5), who have never been rated 2000 or over by the USCF to the finals at Downey, June 19 and 20, Saturday and Sunday. Be sure to send \$5.00 for each of the (3-5) qualifiers (to reach me by June 15). Also send their names and latest rating. This is important. We need this information before the finals start. B. THE FINALS: June 19 & 20 at Downey Chess Club, Rio San Gabriel Park, 9612 Ardine, Downey. All qualifiers to start equal. Five-round Swiss. Time control: 45 moves in 2 hours, 25 moves an hour after. Round 1: 9 a.m. Saturday. Round 2: 2 p.m. Saturday, Round 3: 7 p.m. Saturday, Round 4: 9:00 a.m. Sunday, Round 5: 3 p.m. Sunday. USCF rated. Trophies and money for first 4 places in finals. Bring own sets and clocks. This will help. Should be a big tournament, so have a preliminary section in your club for sure!
