

# CHESS TOURNEY NEARING CLOSE

Minor Contest Presents  
Even Fight

Masters' Battle Centers on  
Second Place

Victorious Alekhine May

The International Chess Congress at Pasadena has settled first-prize winners in the masters' tourney and the women's tourney, but yesterday's results in the minor tourney leave that event still quite evenly contested. A final round today will be required to decide this latter event. With World Champion Alekhine already having first prize in the masters' tourney to his credit, the interest in this event lies in the closing race for second prize, which will not be decided until the closing of the final round today.

In yesterday's session of the minor tourney, J. L. Sheets, Seattle champion, maintained his position in second place by defeating Charles Broughton of Pasadena, and giving him a bare chance of nosing out

# JUNIOR COLL MANY NE

Once they indulged in an all-night session, until breakfast time and then spent the morning on an auto tour, getting back in time to resume their chess struggles in the afternoon and evening.

The final round of the masters' tourney starts today at 2 p.m. with the following pairings: Alekhine vs. Fine; Factor vs. Kashdan; Steiner vs. Reinfeld; Reshevsky vs. Dake; Borochoy vs. Fink; Araiza vs. Bernstein. Any adjourned games will be resumed tomorrow, followed by the awarding of prizes in the various events.
