Blindfold Exhibition

A photographic memory plus a flair for chess are primary requisites for blindfold play. Some masters have played 50-odd games in a simultaneous exhibition. This requires tremendous recall. The blindfold player must be able to remember moves made and project the position. Then he must analyze and proceed with the game.

A modest demonstration of this ability took place Feb. 1 at the Duell Vocational Institute Prison, Tracy, Calif. The performer was Alan Benson, who has not yet achieved master rating in the USCF. The sponsor was Robert Caradien, with Jude Acers calling the moves.

His score was 5-0. Among the contestants were three inmates, four consulting Boy Scouts, and Mr. Caradien. One of these games follows.




Details of his life are revealed in "Reshevsky on Chess," his own story, which was published by the Chess Review in 1948.

The game shown, reprinted in the British Chess Magazine, is given in detail in his book.

It was a blindfold game, both players without sight of the board. R. C. Griffith was then editor of the British Chess Magazine. Reshevsky writes that at that time. chess required no conscious effort. But in top-flight competition now there is much work, preliminary analysis, plus inborn ability to achieve success.

Reshevsky first won the United States title in 1936, and duplicated in the last

Problem No. 6301 By R. Fortune, South Africa 8 Pieces




