
BEAUTY ADDED FEATURE OF CHESS MATCH

North America demonstrated its chess superiority yesterday when U.S. players defeated Latin America in a living game at the Hollywood Athletic Club.

This spectacular match, played on a gigantie board filled with beautiful girls and handsome men, was one of the closing features in the Times-sponsored Pan-American Chess Congress.

Whites Quickly Mated

Herman Pilnik, Argentina, captained the whites. His con-sultants were Hector D. Rossetto, Argentina; Dr. Walter O. Cruz, Brazil; Dr. Jose Alfredo Brodermann, Cuba; Maj. Jose Joaquin Araiza and Joaquin Camerana, Mexico.

Black mated the Latins in 32 oves. White had tried to resign but the large crowd wanted a mate -- so black played

The white queen was Rozanne Murray, Sam Goldwyn player, and her opponent was Barbara Hale, R.K.O. actress. The kings were Bill Williams, R.K.O. player, for black, and Lt. Pace Plagett, U.S.N.R., a chess fan who is on duty at Terminal Island.

The black pawns were natives of South American countries who appeared in formal gowns and the white pawns were Earl wearing white Carroll girls bathing suits.

Fine Takes Second

Fine wound up as secondplace winner in the masters' tournament when Pilnik drew his adjourned game yesterday with Rossetto. Pilnik thus came in third. Had he beaten Rossetto he would have tied Fine. Horowitz was fourth, Irving Kashdan fifth, Rossetto sixth and Steiner and Weaver W. Adams tied for seventh eighth.

Harry Borochow, former California champion, won the masters' reserve tournament with a score of 13\%-2\%. Robert Solana, Cuba, was next with 12-4.

In the A-group Eric Carlson, in a game played just before the living game, nosed out Eugene Moncalian, Mexico, for first place by winning from Joseph H. Keys. Carlson ended with 11½-2½ and Moncalian had 11-3.

Long Beach Man Winner

Winner in the B group was Walter Fieg, Long Beach City College teacher, who had 14%-2%. Dr. A. Kupke was second, 13%-3%, and David Coleman third, 12-5.

E. Levin, representing Roosevelt High School, won the boys' tournament 11-1 and Bob Erickson, Fairfax High School, was next with 8½-3½. Last night prizes were awarded at a banquet in the athletic club, the masters receiving a total of \$3600 divided into eight parts and the other winners receiving cups and other trophies.
