23 grandmasters compete in Lone Pine chess tourney

Twenty three grandmasters, the highest title in chess other than world champion, are competing in the Fifth Annual Louis D. Statham Tournament that began shortly after 1 p.m. Sunday in the Lone Pine Town Hall.

Issac Kashdan, director of play, gave the word that started some 50 contestants concentrating over chess boards with the outcome to be determined on Thursday, April 24. Kashdan said it was a tournament that bordered on the fantastic.

Never had there been so many grandmasters in the U. S. at one time and the number in a single event had been exceeded only in the Chess Olympics.

Among those competing is All a Kushnir, rated the second highest woman player in the world. She is now living in Israel after migrating from Russia.

There will be \$12,500 in prize money with \$4000 going to the winner, \$2500 for second and \$1500 to third place. Others will range

Play will be Sunday through Thursday from 1 to 6 p.m. If games are not finished they will be resumed from 8 to 10 p.m.

Director Kashdan, who is chess editor of the Los Angeles Times, is being assisted by Carl Budd, of Santa Monica, also a veteran official of the Statham tournament.
