A top prize of \$3000 in cash will go to the winner cash will go to the winner of the first Piatigorsky Cup play, which is expected to attract the top eight players of the world. The new cup competition will be held in Beverly Hills, California, in July.

This is expected to become the "Davis Cup of chess" with the \$20,000 necessary financing furnished by Jac-

nancing furnished by Jacqueline Rothschild, wife of Gregor Piatigorsky cellist, as part of the Piatigorsky Foundation's contribution to

chess and education. There will be a valuable perpetual tournament cup, a replica that goes to the win-ning player, cash prizes and expense money for partici-

pants. Only the world's top eight grand masters will play in the initial tourney in July. As of now the players are exof now the players are expected to be Mikhael Botvinnik, Tigar Petrosian, both from the USSR; Bobby Fischer, Brooklyn, the 19-year-old U. S. champion, and Sammy Reshevsky, New York, for the U. S.; S. Najdorf and G. Panno from Argentina; S. Gligoric from Yugoslavia and Frederik Olafson of Iceland. land.
