U. S. Defeats Switzerland; Is 2d in Section

(George Koltanowski, chess columnist of The Chronicle, is now in Helsinki for the Tournament of Nations — the Chess Olympics. A veteran of international master tournaments, Koltanowski was invited as one of the United States team of six. The following is his second dispatch from the tournament.)

HELSINKI, Aug. 14 (By Mail)—
Realizing the danger that it might
not get into the final round, the
U. S. team at the Chess Olympics
today put on great pressure and
defeated Switzerland, 4-0.

The Americans were stung by the remark of Paul Keres of Russia that the U. S. would win first place in the consolation tournament for teams which don't get into the finals.

Today's win put the U. S. team in second place in its section of the preliminaries. Russia, which crushed' Holland, 4-0, today, leads with 14½ points. The U. S. has 11, Finland 10 and Holland 8½.

There are two other preliminary sections, and each section will send its top three teams into the final round. In the first section it seems certain that Argentina, Czechoslovakia and West Germany will take the three top places. In the second East Germany, Hungary, Yugoslavia and Sweden are fighting for the top.

Today's American win was against one of the weaker teams, which Russia also defeated 4-0. Samuel Rashevsky played well on board one to defeat Grob. Larry Evans had no trouble with Morel, winning a pawn and then the game. Robert Byrne seemed to have a dead draw against Bachmann when, in time trouble, he sacrificed a rook and mated his opponent.
