

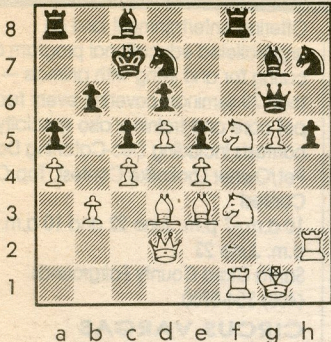

BURLINGAME CHESS CLUB BIDS FAREWELL TO MEMBER

Expert Joe Weiskopf won the Burlingame Chess Club Kimball Howes Farewell Open held May 9-June 6 in Burlingame with a 5-0 score. Steve Olujic placed second at 4-1.

Other prizewinners included Julian Standen and Ray Maglalang (1st and 2nd Class A); Bob Hempe, Charles Clark and Glenn McEnroe (1-3 B); and Ruperto Labaria, Bruce Kirkbride and Monte Swaiss (1-3 C).

The club named its end-of-spring tournament as a farewell to long-time member Kimball Howes, who is returning soon to his native Ohio. Howes has played chess for more than 35 years and edited the *Ohio Chess Bulletin* in the late '50s. He will be remembered as a gracious and tenacious opponent.

The club at 990 Burlingame Ave. will conduct its annual round robin event beginning June 20 at 7:30 p.m. Participants will be grouped in seven-man sections according to USCF rating and will compete against each other. NOTES:

- Nh3 is a testing move against all the Dutch variations — the knight heads for f4 to pressure the pawn on e6 that can't be protected by other pawns.
- Prehistoric thinking was that Black was lost without his "good" bishop (the "bad" white-squared bishop is hemmed in by friendly pawns) in the Stonewall Dutch, but it isn't so.
- Black nabs at least three pawns for his piece with 13...Ng3 14. fg3 Qe3 15. Ne2 Re8.
- ...Ng3 is less attractive now, but Black is setting it up again in a favorable circumstance.
- Frees the knight on d3, but improves Black's fork possibilities.
- 16...Ng3 17.fg3 Ne3 isn't a mature threat because of 18.Rde1 pinning.
- This just invites ...Ng3.
- The remedy in the note to move 15 should work.
34. Rh5 Kh5 35. Qe2 Kh6 36. Qg4 is no cigar.
- A tidy combination! White went on to win in 22 more moves.

SOLUTION: 1.N3h4! Qf7 2.g6 wins.
