

1. Nh3 is a testing move against all the Dutch variations — the knight heads for f4 to pressure the pawn on e6 that can't be protected by other pawns.

2. Prehistoric thinking was that Black was lost without his "good" bishop (the "bad" white-squared bishop is hemmed in by friendly pawns) in the Stonewall Dutch, but it isn't so.

2. Black pages at least three paying for his pairweight.

3. Black nabs at least three pawns for his piece with 13...Ng3 14. fg3 Qe3 15. Ne2 Re8.

4....Ng3 is less attractive now, but Black is setting it up again in a favorable circumstance.

5. Frees the knight on d3, but improves Black's fork possibilites.

6. 16...Ng3 17.fg3 Ne3 isn't a mature threat because of 18.Rde1 pinning

7. This just invites Ng3.

8. The remedy in the note to move 15 should work.

9. 34. Rh5 Kh5 35. Qe2 Kh6 36. Qg4 is no cigar.

10. A tidy combination! White went on to win in 22 more moves.
