

GRANDMASTER SEIRAWAN WINS FIDE CONTINENTAL ACTION TOURNAMENT
Grandmasters Yasser Seirawan, Joel Benjamin and Dimitri Gurevich each scored 9½-3½ at the 1989 FIDE Continental Action Action 3½ at the 1989 FIDE Continental Action Chess Championship held September 22-24 at the Dunfey Hotel in San Mateo. Seirawan was awarded the first place trophy and \$5,000 on tiebreaks. Benjamin earned second place and \$4,000. Gurevich won \$3,000 for third. Fifteen grandmasters and 10 international masters were among the 263 participants competing in six sections for the \$50,000 partice fund.

NOTES:

1. The Classical Variation of the Pirc Defense is enjoying renewed popularity. White counts on simple, rapid development to secure an edge and can play to win while taking none of the risks involved with the Austrian Attack (4. f4).

2. Black is much higher rated than his opponent and avoids 6...Bg4, the well-analyzed main line, and 6... c5, which leads to a queenless middlegame without prospect after 7. dc.

3. Increasing the scope of the bishop on g7. Black makes fine use of the dark squares.
4. Threatening ...c5.
5. 40. Kh2 Bg1 41. Kh1 Bd4 etc.

 Black obtains more pressure and doesn't highlight his dark square weaknesses by playing ...Qa5 and delaying ...Bc3. 2. Cutting off the a1-h8 diagonal so if 8...Qc3 9. Bd2 is embarrassing. The knight is also headed for c7 or is embarr d6 via b5.

SOLUTION: 1. Be6! Be6 2. Qf8! Kf8 3. Ne6 Ke7 4. Nc7 Kd6 5. Ne8 wins.
