
In all, 22 Los Angeles City high schools sent representatives, each certified as winner of his school chess tournament.

Generally, when a smaller country runs a chess tournament to which outside masters are invited, it is the visitors who pick up the major prizes.
This was not the case in Malaga, Spain, which hosted a strong 12-man event. Spanish champion Antonio Medina scored 8½-2½ to win the first prize by a slight but sufficient margin. He won seven games, drew three, and lost only to Franz Kuipers of Holland.
Kuipers tied at 8-3 with Albert O'Kelly de Galway of Belgium. Former Spanish champion Arturo Pomar was in fourth place with 7½-3½. Tied at 7-4 were Dr. Janos Flesch of Hungary and Brazilian champion Antonio Rocha.
