SMYSLOV GAINS LEAD IN WORLD CHESS PLAY

Vassily Smyslov has a one-point lead against World Champion Mikhail Botwinnik in the match being contested in Moscow, according to a report from the New York Times. Smyslov has won three, lost two and drawn four of the nine games

concluded to date.

The eighth game, which was the latest victory for the challenger, started with the Sicilian Defense, Smyslov playing the White pieces. The opening was along well-tried lines, when Smyslov introduced a novel twist which bothered Botwinnik. The champion, seeking safety, lost two Pawns before adjournment. He resigned before time for resuming play.

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Smyslov maintained his lead in the ninth game by a draw in 41 moves. Symslov resorted to the Indian Defense against the English Opening and held the upper hand for the first 20 moves. He lost ground when he evaded an exchange of Queens and could make no further progress.

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The seventh game was the shortest of the series so far, the players agreeing to a draw after 23 moves. Botwinnik conducted the White pieces. The challenger countered with the Queen's Indian Defense. Both proceeded with so much caution that neither was able to make any impression. They soon realized that there were no prospects of creating weaknesses in the opposing ranks.

Following are the scores of the earlier games of the match.

FIRST MATCH GAME

Botwinnik is hardly recognizable in this game. After a quiet opening he piays to simplify, seeming content with a peaceful conclusion. But when most of the pieces are off, it turns out that Smyslov's Bishop is more effective, with a particularly valuable target in the QRP. Botwinnik tries for belated counterplay, which leads only to a couple of harmless checks. At the end, Smyslov's passed Pawn is a sure winner.

After nine rounds of the International Masters Tournament at Mar del Plata in Argentina, Miguel Najdorf of Buenos Aires was in the lead with a score of 8-1, according to a report from the New York Times. Najdorf defeated Horacio Albert of Argentina in a King's Indian Defense lasting 28 moves to retain his lead in the ninth round. Najdorf is undefeated, with seven wins and two draws. In second place was Paul Keres of Russia with 7½-1½. Another Russia with 7½-1½. Another Russia in, Alexander Kotov, is tied for third at 7-1 with Oscar Panno of Argentina. Each has an unfinished game. Keres and Kotov were content to draw a Nimzovitch Defense in 17 moves. Panno won from Raul Sanguinetti of Argentina on the White side of a Queen's Indian Defense in 39 moves.

William Lombardy of New York, the only American player in the tournament, is in fifth place with 6-3. He defeated Hec-
