



RESHEVSKY LEADS NAJDORF

NEW YORK, June 12—The sixth game of the match between Samuel Reshevsky of New York and Miguel Najdorf of Buenos Aires for the chess championship of the west was drawn in Buenos Aires, according to a report received from Argentina.

Reshevsky, consequently, held his point lead with a score of 3½-2½, comprising two games won, one lost and three drawn. The rivals will play 18 games.

Both consumed their time allowance in the sixth game and in order to avoid a finish under a stepped-up time limit agreed to draw after 27 moves.

The New Yorker had outplayed the South American in their first session of the third encounter and was counted on to gain his second victory. This expectation was fulfilled when, on resumption of play, Najdorf found that it was impossible to stave off defeat. His resignation followed and Reshevsky regained the lead at 2½-1½.

Play was then resumed in the fourth game in which Reshevsky had played the black side of a queen's pawn opening to a position in which the forces were exactly even. Subsequent play failed to produce any advantage for either side and a draw—the second of the series—was agreed on. The fifth round had resulted in a draw.
