(a) 5—P Q3, followed by P KKt3 and B Kt2 is a safe defense; but the more attacking text move is frequently played by Rosenthal.

(b) The Queen's square being occupied by the Rook proved later on a great embarassment to the defense. On principle, we should not move another piece in the diagonal of the adverse Bishop.

(c) The sacrifice seems to be perfectly sound.

(d) A plausible defense, as the advance of the adverse QP would be very dangerous. Besides, it shuts out the Bishop. We have tried 15—QR K sq or Q2, followed by Q Q sq and B K2, but it proves unsatisfactory.

Gunsberg, first prize, fourteen games; H. E. Bird (probably), second prize. Solution tourney—Four-mover, first prize, J. Gunsberg; second prize, H. E. Bird. Three-mover—prize winner, Herbert Jacobs. Consultation matches—First prize, Mason and Donisthorpe; second prize, Bird and Hewett; third prize, Gunsberg and Hunter. Lord Tennepon's prize—W. H. K. Pollock, score six and a half games out of a possible seven. Professor Ruskin's prize—J. Mortimer, score five games out of a possible six.

The International Chess Congress at Hamburg commenced on the 12th instant. The entries include the names of Messrs. J. H. Blackburn, H. E. Bird, Jas. Mason, and J. Gunsberg, of London; Captain G. H.
