

(h) Beautifully played, and the merit of the sacrifice is greatly en-hanced by its having been foreseen and purposed by Mr. Burns when he made his eighteenth move (i) K K sq; 25 B Kt6 ch, R B2; 26 B x R ch, K Q2 would prolong the game, but White would, of course, win easily.
