Imre König, the well-known master and author, gave a simultaneous exhibition at the Golden Gate Chess Club, Hotel Cecil, San Francisco, on December 30. Meeting 20 players, König won 14 games, lost 2 and drew 4, in a trifle over 3 hours play. Robert Currie and Charles Bagby won their games in pretty style.

Siegfried Engelhardt Verlag announces publication of what may well be one of the most important books of recent years—*Emanuel Lasker*, by Dr. J. Hannak of Vienna. The book is distinguished by a foreword by Professor Albert Einstein. The book is a complete biographical treatment of the late World Champion, and contains 100 of the great master's games. The German master Rudolf Tescher and other leading players contribute to the purely chess part of the work.
