San Francisco Open Tournament

The first annual San Francisco Open Chess Tournament, sponsored by Bechtel Employes Club, will be held Saturday and Sunday, Nov. 18-19, at the Hilton Hotel, Teakwood and Walnut Suites, at Mason and O'Farrell Streets in San Francisco.

A guaranteed prize fund, which may be augmented if entries warrant, will be divided among the winners of three classes:

Class Expert/A: First prize, \$125; second, \$75; third, \$25.

Classes B and C: First prizes, \$50; second, \$25.

The five-round Swiss system event will be directed by international chess master George Koltanowski.

Registration for the Expert/A section must be accomplished prior to 9 a.m., Saturday, Nov. 18. Classes B and C may sign up from 10 a.m. to noon the same day.

Entry fee is \$7 for all classes, plus mandatory membership in the United States Chess Federation for Class Expert/A.

- (a) An unusual opening finesse. In just two moves the game has progressed from a Center Counter to a Blackmar Gambit, and is still open to transposition if Black plays 2...P—K3, 2...P—QB3 or 2...N—QB3.
 - (b) Blacks adopts a purely defensive setup.
- (c) The Knight, too, is slated to bolster Black's position before committing his King to the battle zone
- (d) Inconsistent. The Bishop, hemmed in by his own Pawns, remains undeveloped here and, what is worse, intercepts the Black Queen's line to Q3.
- (e) Black must reconcile himself to a positional minus and castle now or never.
 - (f) More precise is 14 P-Q6 BxP 15 BxN PxB.
- (g) Black puts up more fight after 14...BxB, but White still retains a Pawn's worth of initiative.
- (h) Forced. If 16...K—K2, then 17 N—Q5ch wins outright, while 16...K—B1 fails against 17 BxN RPxB 18 NxBch QxN 19 N—K5 and 20 NxPch.
- (i) Black's attempt to recover the piece without Incurring disadvantage elsewhere meets with a brilliant refutation.
