(a) With the dual purpose of providing a safe retreat for his KB on QR2 and defending his KP against Black's threatened P-QN4-N5, followed by NxP.

(b) Black is anxious to exert pressure along the long

white diagonal.

(c) Failing to castle at this point causes Black to fall under enduring attack. The equalizing line runs 9...0.0 10 P-B4 B-N2 11 P-B5! P-K4 12 N/4-K2 QN-Q2! (White's KP is poisoned.) 13 N-N3 R-B1 (better than 13...N-B4) 14 B-N5 N-N3 15 N-R5 N-B5! (Rolf Schwarz, "Die Sizilianische Verteidigung," Hamburg, 1961, p. 188).

(d) White gets three Pawns for his Bishop, shatters

Black's K-side, and exposes the enemy King to further

assault,

Before routinely accepting the sacrifice, Black (e) should consider his practical chances for survival after 10...0-0, e.g., 11 B-Q5 NxB 12 PxN B-KB3.

Opening the center now represents an act of selfdestruction. After 14...R-Q1 Black just might hold out long

enough to exchange off some of White's attackers.

(g) Ignoring the win of a piece, White concentrates on killing a King.

(h) The crusher.

Of course not 23...KxN 24 R-K6, but the text move leads straight to mate.
