

A seemingly minor opening inaccuracy in this game (4... P—Q3) cramps Black's development so badly that he soon crumbles under the relentless pressure White brings to bear on his position.

(a) White wants to play a Blackmar Gambit (after 2...P-Q4 3 P-K4 PxP 4 P-B3).

(b) With 4...P—Q4 the opening transposes into a French Defense. The text move is inferior.

Attempts too much; 6 B-Q3 gives needed protection (c) to White's KP and safeguards the Bishop from attack.

Well played.

Beginning a freeing maneuver which, however, fails to relieve his game.

In spite of his mistake on move six, White has emerged from the opening with a clear positional plus.

(g) Now Black's "bad Bishop" is hemmed in even more

than before, but there seems to be no playable alternative.

(h) This pawn-grabbing sortie is ill conceived at such a critical juncture. Black must not delay activating his Bishop with 18...QR—N1 and 19...P—QB4,

White's attack is irresistible.

(j) As a last ditch stand, Black can try 22...PxQP 23 PxRP QxBP 24 Q-N4 P-N3 25 RxP P-Q6.

Allows a winning combination. Only 23...P—B3 puts off the inevitable for a while longer.
