(a) Threatening 7 BxN.

(b) More flexible is 7 P-K3, but I was trying to encourage him to do something unusual.

(c) Black must be a fan of the Cambridge Springs De-

fense, but this is not the position for it. He should try for King side play. (d) Now Black can't play 9...N-K5 because his King

is exposed.

(e) If Black wants to play N-K5 right away, one possibility is 10 . . . BxN 11 PxB N-K5 12 P-B4?! NxB 13 NxN P-KR3? 14 B-R7ch K-R1 15 B-N8 P-KN3 16 BxP PxN 17 QxP

RxB 18 QxR, winning.

(f) This maneuver is intended to delay Black's N-K5. It is not a sacrifice, for if 11 . . . NxN 12 PxN RxP 13 BxN PxB 14 BxPch. Black's reply is practically forced, for if 11 . . . P-KR3 12 NxN BxN/2 13 B-R4, and Black can't play N-K5 for a long time. White will play P-QR3 and if Bishop back attack

on the Queen side or if BxN attack in the center with P-K4.

(g) To be considered was 13 . . . NxB, though after 14

(g) To be considered was 13 . . . NxB, though after 14
N-B4 his pieces are awkward.

(h) Not 14 . . QxBP 15 BxN or 14 . . NxQBP 15 BxPch.
But better was 14 . . . P-KR3 and if 15 P-QB4, threatening 16
P-B5 and 17 P-B3, then simply 15 . . P-QN3.

(1) Not 15 . . . NxP 16 B-K1.

(j) Threatens P-K5 and B-B6. One possibility is 16 . . .

QR-QB1 17 P-K5 N-K1, although it is hard to defend against White's Q-B1-R6 and B-B6 along with P-KB4. R-B3-R3. Another possibility is 16 . . . PxP 17 PxP Q-R5.

(k) Black's last chance was to divert some of the attack with 17 . . P.B5 18 B-K2 N-B4 19 B-B6 KR-N1 and if 20 Q-Q2,

... P-B5 18 B-K2 N-B4 19 B-B6 KR-N1 and if 20 Q-Q2, with 17

N-N2 21 Q-R6 N-K1. (1) If 18 BxN Black would defend with 18 . . . BxB 19 PxP 20 B-B6 Q-B4.

- (m) A bad mistake would be 19 Q-Q2 because of 19 . . .
- (n) One last try to save the game. If White hastily plays 21 QxN, then 21 ... QxB.

(o) Winning the Knight. Black should resign.

(p) Wins the Queen.
