(a) Intending to launch a fierce attack after the natural 4... N-B3 with 5 P-Q4 (Max Lange).

(b) A thoroughly acceptable move, solid and safe. Robert Wormald wrote in 1875, "The authorities are unanimous in recommending 4... N-B3 as Black's best move; but, for our own part, we confess we fail to recognize its superiority over 4... P-Q3. The latter line of play, at any rate, possesses the merit of avoiding the embarrassing attack arising from 5 P-Q4" ("The Chess Openings," London, 1875, p. 23).

(c) If White still wants to work up an attack, he does better to operate with direct threats in the center, e.g., 6 P-B3 Q-K2 (6 . . . NxP is too

risky) 7 P-Q4 B-N3.

(d) And not 8 . . . BxB, opening the game for

White.

(e) Hoping to crush his opponent quickly, White strikes out too soon with too little, paying dearly for his overconfidence. A good move here is 9 Q-Q2.

(f) Of course!

(g) White has still not learned his lesson: better to admit the error of his ways and struggle on with 10 PxN QxN 11 Q-B3.

(h) Completely demoralized, White misses his last chance to extricate the piece and conjure up

an attack with 12 Q-R5.

(i) A fine "psychological" victory for Hale.
