KOLTANOWSKI AT CAL STATE

Celebrated "blindfold" artist and international chess master George Koltanowski took on two dozen opponents in a pair of simultaneous exhibitions at Cal State University in Hayward, May 30, and defeated them all, 24-0. An amazing performance by a 70-year-old man whose ability seems to improve with age.

Here is an outstanding example of his chess powers, vigor-ously prosecuted against Class "A" player Hiawatha Bradley, recorded in USCF endorsed coordinate notation (files lettered "a" to "h", ranks numbered "1" to "8", always counting from White's lower left corner regardless of whose

turn to move; pawn captures designated by file letters only).

Strauss, a U. C. Riverside researcher, scored 5-2 in the eight-man round robin event conducted by the California State Chess Federation.

Finishing in a tie for second were Dennis Fritzinger and James Tarjan 4½-2½, followed by Larry Christiansen and Ronald Gross, 3½-3½, Craig Barnes and James McCormick,

2½-4½, and Julius Loftsson, 2-5.
