(a) In my opinion, this move only helps White gain time. (b) Here I decided to play for the attack, so I sacked the knight pawn.

(c) Saving R-N1 for the next move.

(d) And here I fully expected 12. . . P-K4, which seems to

stall White's attack.

(e) I don't understand the reason for this move. Black's position is already difficult, but why keep on moving the same pieces around?

Threatening to win the queen after 16 N-Q6ch, if Black takes, or to pick up the exchange for starters, if he

(g) Despair, but Black's game already looks untenable.

(h) Ready to win the queen again, this time by 19 N-B6ch followed by 20 N-Q5ch.

(i) Probably the only way to prolong the struggle.
(j) Black has no choice, since 19. . ,BxN20 QxB leads to a

forced mate for White.

(k) The point! Taking the knight allows 21 BxP!
(l) And not 21. . .K-B1 on account of 22 BxP! again.
(m) If 22 QxB, then 22. . .N-Q4 is annoying and slows down

White's attack.

(n) Threatening 24 BxP!, after which White's QR can play

to KB3, KN3 or KR3, depending on Black's response.

(o) Now White threatens to pick off Black's queen with 27 B-Q8ch, and if he moves the queen away the discovered cheeck will bury him.

(p) Forced.

(q) There are just too many threats for Black to defend.
