

C.F.N.C. members who glance at our masthead when they receive their copy of CHESS IN ACTION will note that several changes have been effected.

The principal reason for these changes is the fact that BILL STEVENS, our Tournament Administrator since the founding of C.F.N.C., recently received a promotion in his work that placed a heavy increase on the demand for his time. Because the duties of the tournament administrator are extensive and time-consuming (as all veteran C.F.N.C. players well know), Bill felt he could no longer do justice to both.

269 players participated in the 15th Annual Sonoma Open Air Chess Festival.

JOHN BLACKSTONE (Saratoga) won the "Expert/A" division trophy, the "B" division
was taken jointly by BLMIN MEYER (Oakland) and N. ROSEN (Alameda) and the "C" division was split three ways by MANUEL RIVERA (Pittsburg), JERRY LONG (Concord) and
N. JOHNSON (Berkeley). Bach of the above players received a trophy.

Mrs. JOAN OYLER (Antioch) took the Women's Division, and PHILLIP QUIRARTE (San
Francisco) captured the Junior Division title. The KOLTY CHESS CLUB (San Francisco)

won special awards for number of club entries and best scores obtained by its mem-

bers.

Simultaneous exhibitions were given by Capt. JOHN HUDSON (Nather AFB), DON SUTHERLAND (San Francisco), DENNIS SACCUZZO (Corte Madera), 12-year-old RIDGELEY SCHNEIDER (Redwood City), JOHN SMAIL (Berkeley) and AKI KANAMORI (San Francisco).

99 players turned out for the recent Oakland Open Tournament organized by Ted Anderson.

STEVE JOPLIN (Oakland) took 1st place in the "Expert/A" division with $4\frac{1}{2}-\frac{1}{2}$. Splitting 2nd, 3rd and 4th places were JAMES HURT (Saratoga), DENNIS SACCUZZO (Corte Madera) and WILLIAM WEHRMEISTER, Jr., with $3\frac{1}{2}-1\frac{1}{2}$ scores. Behind them were R.S. HENDERSON (Berkeley) and PAUL VAYSSIE (San Francisco) with 3-2. There were

32 players in this section.

The "B" division (with 34 entries) was won by ALLEN GOLBERT (Alameda) with a 4½-½ score. RANDALL HOUGH (Stockton), GEORGE FRENCH (Berkeley) STEVE ADELMAN (Atherton), DAVID RAPPAPORT (Berkeley), R.C. JACOB (Walnut Creek), WILLIAM PARKER (Oakland) and KEN YAMAMOTO (Berkeley) were bunched in a 2nd place tie with 4-1.

The "C" division, with 29 players, was headed by LEONARD TROTTIER (El Cerrito) with 4½-½. AL CABRAL (Oakland), MIKE PUST (Santa Clara), ROBERT ALEXANDER (San Francisco) and NATHAN OAKLANDER (Berkeley) all scored 4-1 behind Trottier.

After them were DAVID AMME (Woodside), PAUL MEYER (Saratoga), D.P. LYNN (Saratoga) and CHARLES PARCELLS (Folsom) scoring 3½-1½. BRUCE HANSEN (Walnut Creek) won the "Sunday Special" tourney.

The OAKLAND CHESS CLUB has moved to new quarters in the Lincoln Elementary School at 225-11th Street, Oakland. The club's name has been formally changed from "Oakland Central YMCA Chess Club" to "Oakland Chess Club."

R.S. HENDERSON (Berkeley) scored a decisive 7-3 win over R.P. McClary (San Francisco) in a CFNC/USCF-rated match played during the summer.

JOHN SMAIL (Berkeley) won the "Expert/A" trophy and with it, the Berkeley Chess Club's 1965 championship, in a tournament recently concluded at the Berkeley YMCA. RAY CUNEO (Oakland) and STEVE JOPLIN (Oakland) tied for 2nd place, and Ray subsequently won the tie-breaking playoff game. 1st place in the "B" division went to JERRY LONG (Concord) and the runner-up was ROBERT TREMBERTH (Oakland). HENRY BAER (Berkeley) captured the "C" division title, with 2nd place in that section going to NORMAN JOHNSON (Oakland).

International Master GEORGE KOLTANOWSKI made the trophy presentations at the club's Championship Awards Banquet on September 29, 1965. High spots of the evening were addresses by two officials of the YMCA, who attended as honor guest, and the presentation to Kolty of a handsome plaque in recognition of his activities in

promoting amateur chess.

The CFNC Open Tournament held in Berkeley on October 2/3 finished with the following lineup of winners: 1st place in the "Expert/A" group was taken by JOHN BLACKSTONE (Saratoga) with $4\frac{1}{2}-\frac{1}{2}$. Tied for 2nd, 3rd and 4th places were RAY SCHUTT (San Jose), GARY PICKLER (Danville) and ROY MCCOLLOUGH (Oakland) with 4-1 scores. R. CLIPSON (Concord) swept the "B" section with 5-0, followed by BLMO MUGNANI (San Francisco), R. INGRAM (Sacramento) and R. CHRISTIAN (Santa Rosa) with 4-1.

Another sweep was recorded by D. CAMPBELL (Orinda) in the "C" division. In 2nd place was M. RASMUSSEN (Oakland) with $4\frac{1}{2}-\frac{1}{2}$, and B. GARRISON (San Leandro) and K. ALTMAN (Burlingame) tied for 3rd and 4th with 4-1.

A special feature will be the club's "junior program." Beginning October 22, (6:30-7:30 P.M.) a free lecture series will be made available to all interested high school students. high school students.



"ERRARE HUMANUM EST ..."

The average chess fan usually has the impression that mistakes in chess are the exclusive province of "patzers," and that the games of masters and grandmasters are supposed to be free of these mishaps, and faultlessly conducted to a logical end.

However, actual tournament and match play shows that this is not always so, and that grandmasters are only human beings, with faults, errors and nervousness. As cases in point, study the following positions from the recent Marianske Lazne (Marienbad) Tournament:

STAHLBERG



KERES

The diagrammed position is complicated. Black is threatening 21.., N-B7; winning at least the QP. White has little clock-time left, and must make another twenty moves. There followed 21.N-N3!, a very good move, simultaneously attacking both Black Bishops. Less favorable for White would have been 21.BxN, BxB; or even 21.N-B6+, BxN; 22.BxN, R-K1; and the second player has good compensation for his Pawn.

But the text move gives Black a difficult choice. He cannot now play 21...,N-B7 because of 22.NxB, NxQ; 23. NxB+, K-R1; 24.RxN, and White's three pieces, in conjunction with his passed Pawn, are worth more than the Queen. So, the actual reply 20...B-K3 was practically forced.

Now I considered --- for a long time --- the continuation 22.Q-N1, N-B7; 23.R/IxB, PIR; 24.Q-N3, but then noticed that after 24...,R-B3; 25.N-K5, Black has the strong reply 25...,QIP!, threatening Mate. So, I dropped the idea of the exchange sacrifice, and continued 22.BIN?, and after 22...BB;


I still had to play well to secure a draw. The continuation was 23,R-QB1, P-QR4: 24,RRR, BXR; 25,N-K5, Q-B1; 26,R-N6, B-Q4; 27,P-QR3, B-QB6; 28, Q-Q1, P-B3; 29,N-N4, Q-Q1; 30,R-N5, B-K3; 31,P-R3, Q-Q2; 32,P-QR4, R-Q1; 33,P-Q5, BXP; 34,N-K3, B-K3; 35,QXQ, RXQ; 36,N-K4, B-N5; 37,N-B5, and a draw was agreed.

After the game was over, I still felt there was something better for White in the position, and analysis revealed the correct line. White would have obtained a decisive advantage by simply continuing 22.R/lxB!, PxR; 23.Q-K1, and it is easy to see that Black cannot protect both his Knight and KP. If 22.., N-B7; then 23.Q-KB!! wins the necessary tempo.

Quite easy, everyone will say, but both grandmasters overlooked this rather obvious continuation.

Even more embarassing is the following example from the same tourment. After playing very well, Uhlmann had reached this position:

One can readily see that White has a technically easy win with 40. RxP, RxP, RxP, 41.PxR, etc., or 40.R-N7+, K-R3; 41.RxKNP, RxR; 42.B-K3, etc. With his opponent in time trouble and having more than forty minutes left on his own clock, Uhlmann made the incredible blunder 40.PxP??, and after 40...KxR; of course resigned. The reason is hard to find, but this case once more confirms that grandmasters, too, are only human.

The interesting and extremely complicated position below arose during a recent encounter between Padewski and ex-World Champion Mikhail Tahl.

With his last move (25...,P-Q5) Black simultaneously attacked White's Queen and K-Rook, hoping in this way to find an adequate defense against the powerful threat of 26.P-K6. But Tahl would not be Tahl if he were to miss here the combination 26.P-K6! PxQ: 27.

 $\frac{PxR}{Q8}$. White is now threatening 28.P- $\frac{Q8}{Q8}$ -Q+, and after the almost forced reply 27...B-N2; White played 28.Nx BP: and Padewski, in great time trouble, could find no defense. He therefore resigned the game at this point, for which he came under very

heavy criticism.

It is obvious that 28..,N-B3; 29.

R-K8+, etc., or 28..,BrR; 29.N-K8+,

K-N2; 30.P-Q8=q, etc., would lose quickly, but what about the continuation 28...Q-B6 -- ? Now the obvious 29.B-Q6 would not be so good. Black 29.B-Q0 would not be so good. Black could not play for the trap 29..,PxP+; 30.K-N1, B-K5; 31.N-K8+, K-N2; 32.P-Q8-Q? BxR! 33.KxB, Q-B6+; 34.K-N1, Q-Q6+; 35.K-R2, P-N8-Q+! and wins, (e.g. 36.RxQ, Q-B7+; etc.) because of White's much better line in 32.B-N2! QxB; 33.P-Q8=Q, winning. But, after 29.., N-B3! the matter is not so clear.

Tahl had in mind (after 28..,Q-B6) a continuation which is much more convincing, namely 29.N-Q5+! Now then, the ending after 29..,QxB; 30.NxQ, Burk; 31.Rin, is clearly hopeless for Black; and (after 29...K-R1) there follows 30.B-N2! QxB/7; 31.N-B7+, K-N1; 32.N-K8+, K-R1; 33.P-Q8=Q+, etc., and White wins easily. A very fine performance on Tahl's part. It is to be regretted that Padewski did not play 28.., Q-B6; thereby allowing the spectators to see the surprising final combination.

OUR COVER PROBLEM

The solving of end-game studies certainly is of great value for the practical player, but not all kinds of end-games will afford pleasure and satisfaction for the solver. I refer here to various tasks with unnatural positions, variations with unclear final positions, requiring deep analysis which would fill many pages.

On the other hand, there are many compositions which directly invite one to find their solution. Quite often simple positions leave one with the impression that it is impossible to achieve the required win or draw -- but -- the greater is the enjoyment and satisfaction when the hidden idea is discovered.

To illustrate this, I would like to call the attention of chess fans to a relatively simple composition which I found some time ago. It is an end-game sti by the well known Swiss composer S. Isenegger, first published in 1949 in the It is an end-game study Berne chess magazine Schweizerische Schachzeitung.

In the position in question, White is to play and draw. Our first glance at it brings us the conviction that White's only chance is his passed Pawn, and that his first move must therefore be 1.P-N7. But, now, what to do after 1...,R-N8 - ? Black now threatens 2...,R-R8+ and 3...,R-N8+, which would follow after 2.P-N8-Q. Let us therefore try 2.B-B5, which takes the white square under control, and threatens 3.P-N8-Q. But, Black then plays 2...,R-N7! and there is no good defense against 3...,R-QN7; etc. The other possibility to control White's QN1, e.g., 2.B-R2, is answered by 2...,R-QR8; and now White will lose his Pawn after 3..,RxB+ and 4...,R-N7+; etc. A King-move on White's second turn also fails to help, as Black has the strong reply 2...R-QN8. has the strong reply 2..,R-QN8.

Now we have considered all obvious possibilities for White, and have found good replies for Black. As the position is quite simple and natural, we are inclined to believe that there isn't any solution, and that the position shown must be a to believe that there isn't any solution, and that the position shown must be a misprint. Everything seems to be too clear to allow a surprise. Nonetheless, the surprise is there. After 1.P-N7, R-N8; White continues with 2.B-R2! and, after 2..,R-QR8; he plays 3.K-N4! A wonderful idea! After 3..,RxB; there follows 4.K-B3! threatening 5.P-N8-Q. The forced continuation 4..,R-R6+; 5.K-N2, R-N6+; 6.K-R1! leads to a position where Black has no defense against the threat of a stalemate by 7.P-N8=Q, RxQ. One way or the other, Black must allow the draw.

Did you like this ending-study? I did, very much. These simple and clear positions with surprising solutions make one realize, once again, what a wonderful game is chess.

MISSED OPPORTUNITIES

Our first instance of an opportunity missed is illustrated below.



With Black to play, the game continued as follows:

1.		RxR+?
2.	KxR	RxR

Arriving at a well known "book" position which is a draw. However, Black could have won very easily by playing instead:

1.		R-B8
2.	RxR	RxR+
3.	KTR	K+R

This leads to yet another well known position, but one which Black wins, because he holds the "opposition." This is just one more example of a King vs. King+Pawn ending where a working knowledge of the opposition

often means the difference between a win and a draw.

In our second example of a missed opportunity, White to play - resigned. However, he would have won by 1.R-Q6!



If Black replies 1..,PxR; then 2.P-B7, after which White's passed Pawns on the K-side march on, and Black will be forced to give up both his Rooks for them. Black's only alternative (after 1.R-Q6) would therefore have been 1.., RIR; and the continua-tion might have been:

2.	P-N8=Q+	K-Q2
3.	QxP+	K-B3
4.	Q-K4+	K-N3
5	O-NILL	PRSTONS

White gives up his Queen for a Rook, and then advances his forward B-Pawn to be promoted. All Black can then do is surrender his remaining Rook for this promoted Pawn, after which White's other passed Pawns and extra piece will prove decisive.

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
