

# announcing the MONTEREY COUNTY OPEN CHESS TOURNAMENT co-sponsored by

the Salinas Chess Club and Chess Friends of Northern California

The tournament will be at least 5 rounds (Swiss System), directed by International Master George Koltanowski. It is open to all chess players who are, or will become, members of CFNC. The tournament will be rated by CFNC, providing an opportunity for all players to acquire a rating, or to improve their present rating.

A trophy and/or plaque will be awarded to the 1st-place winner. Books and other prizes will be awarded to 2nd through 7th places, as well as a number of surprise prizes to various players who finish all of their tournament games. Players are requested to bring their own boards, men and clocks.

Fees will be accepted at the start of the tournament. However, for the sake of better pairings, it is recommended that entrants register well in advance. To do this, or to acquire additional information, write to:

It is advisable to make room reservations in advance, as auto races are being held in Salinas on the same weekend. The WONDERLODGE is suggested.

The tournament will be held on Saturday and Sunday, June 9/10. Registration will begin at 9 a.m. Saturday, with the players' meeting at 11:30 a.m. The 1st Round will commence PROMPTLY at 12:00 noon. The time control for the first two rounds will be 40 moves in 1-1/2 hours; 45 moves in 2 hours for the last three rounds. The decision of the Tournament Director will be final in all matters.





BEDFORD, QUINLIVAN and INGRAM take 1962 CFNC OPEN CHAMPIONSHIP TROPHIES -

The annual CFNC Open Championship Tournament was held March 17th and 18th, 1962, at the Oakland Y. M. C. A.

The "Expert/A" Class, with 34 entries, was headed by Mitchell Bedford, 33, of Salinas, with a 4-1/2-1/2 score. Bedford is a psychology teacher at Hartnell College in Salinas. Although he has been playing chess for about twenty years, this was his first tournament.


Mike Quinlivan, 16, scored 100% to win the 36-player "B" Class Title. Mike, a member of the Oakland YMCA, goes to Bishop O'Dowd High School, and has been a chess player for only 2-1/2 years. You'll be hearing a lot more of him in the near future.

Louis Ingram, a member of the Kolty Chess Club in San Francisco, took home all the marbles in the "C" Class, with a 5-0 score. He is married, with three children, and runs his own clinical laboratory in San Francisco. Ingram, a faithful participant in CFNC activities, is notorious for his end-game "swindles." His victory was well received by his many friends.

Surprise prizes in the regular class sections were awarded to Mrs. Lena Grumette, Mrs. Mabel Burlingame, La Roy O'Doan, Ralph McMillen, Don Day and John Gorham. The two "Sunday Special" tournaments were won by Sam Bettencourt of San Francisco, and John Lasich of Berkeley.


