WOODPUSHER'S DREAM TOURNAMENT By Fred M. Vren

Is there anyone in the audience old enough to remember Fibber McGee's closet which he was always going to get around to clean out - someday? I don't know whether he ever got around to it, but I was reminded of it the other day when I started going over some old files which have accumulated over the past thirty years, to determine what, if anything, could be salvaged, and what could safely be consigned to the incinerator. What treasures of chess lore were uncovered! Correspondence with the late George Sturges regarding the possibility of holding a tournament in Boston in 1930, to determine the chess champion of the American Legion, which was holding its annual convention in Boston that year. An invitation to accompany the Canadian team to Euenos Aires in 1939 - at my own expense - by virtue of my high position as a Director of the Canadian Chess Federation. Courtesy cards for the Boston City Club and the Washington Chess Divan, through the kindness of W.M.P. Mitchell and Brother Wigginton, respectively. Letters from S.S. Cohen and Herman Helms, respective editors of Chess Review and the American Chess Bulletin, each suggesting that certain material which I had submitted for publication might better suit the needs and clientele of the other magazine.

In the same file I found what appeared to be a rough draft of an article which I know I wrote, but which I am sure was never published. There was no title, and no date. I read it over once, and threw it in the wastebasket. The next day - I am my own wastebasket-empty-outer now - I looked at it again. I decided that I would copy it and send it to CHESS IN ACTION. If you read this you will know that the keepers of the keys to chess literature agree with me that this priceless piece of fantasy should be placed in its proper niche. If it is not published, I will know that they have agreed among themselves that I should have left it in the basket. Here it is:

How many of the Tonday-morning-quarterbacks(1) ever give a thought to the really vital issues confronting the American people at this time? How many of them even know that there is a great issue which is soon to be fought out, the results of which may be epic, or even colossal? The chess fans of the nation need no reminder that I am referring to the coming East-West chess tournament soon to be held at?. You notice that the place is not named. And for a good reason - nobody knows yet. The promoters have wisely decided to out-smart the ticket speculators and scalpers. Special trains bearing the all-star teams will leave New York and San Francisco at the same time, headed in the general direction of the Mississippi. Wherever the trains meet - that's where the tournament will be held. (And shame on those who have publicly voiced the hope that they meet on a single track at night!)(2)

Regardless of when or where they meet, the tournament is bound to be a titanic event. Think of the issues involved. Think of the decade-old (3) feud between Quincey of Boston and Lake of the western team, which will be settled by their game on Board 5. The theoretical value of this game cannot be estimated. Pages of newspaper chess columns and even books have been written covering both sides of this controversy and now it is to be decided by personal combat. Quincey claims that

his 1.P-K4 must win, while Lake contends that his 17. ---; 0-0. will decide in his favor.

Another game which will have the spectators panting with auticipation will be played between Ashturn of New York and the beautical Nostalgia, Hollywood's most cherished contribution to the week a team. Mannattan's pride loves his bishots, and has been known to say the exchange in order to come into the end game with his two by the exchange in order to come into the end game with his two by the intact. The shapely Mostalgia, on the other hand, has a preference for knights, and, like Tuwe, she knows how to use them to best advantage. Will Ashburn forsake his favorite strategy in order to get a Four Knights Game with the beautiful screen star? Will he decide that a knight against Mostalgia is better than a bishop against Flohr? The cause of Chess is bound to be enriched by this game, regardless of its outcome.

If Smithfield, Alekning, and Euwe are analyzing a game, and, on a certain move which Euwe and Alekhine call bad. Smithfield as d. "Best", the move is "Best" so far as Jones is concerned. What a game this will be! Master and pupil, each playing the same system, using the same strategy and tactics' Jones knows by heart every game which Smithfield has ever played. Smithfield knows every one of the boy's tricks and strategems, for he taught them to him. Smithfield will not dare to win, for that would prove that his teaching had been failty. Neither could he lose, for with the loss of the game he would have face as an authoritative writer and teacher. What a mental hazard he faces going into this important game. (5)
