


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

Our problems for this issue consist of a mate-in-one variant reminiscent of our earlier problems No. 1 and No. 2; a straight-forward mate-in-two; a forceful mate-in-three; and an equally forceful mate-in-four. Problem No. 17 requires that you look for the unusual. Problem No. 18 has two variations. Problem No. 19 requires White to break the stalemate; the C. problem leaves White with a poisonous mate in two. Problem No. 20 poses White the problem of how to extricate his badly-placed piece. (the Knight is out of play, and it appears that the Rook could hardly have been placed on a less effective square); however, be of good cheer for a winning line exists and the Black monarch meets death from an unexpected direction.

Prizes will be awarded for the first set of correct solutions sent in by a B-player and by a C-player. Honorable mention will be made in Chess In Action for all members sending in correct solutions.

## editorial

Permit us to introduce ourselves. We are Richard Lee and Raymond Ng, the acting co-editors of Chess In Action. We are presently officers of the Oakland Chess Club (Richard is the Treasurer and Raymond is the Secretary and Tournament Director). It was reported in the Fall 1969 issue that Dick Phillips had been transferred by his company to Arizona and would no longer be the editor of the magazine. A request was made for "volunteers". For some strange unknown reasons, we volunteered.

The main difference in this magazine is the printers. It was also reported in the Fall 1969 issue that it had cost about \$300 to get out an issue of Chess In Action. In order to reduce this cost, we have entered into the printing hobby and will be printing, as well as typing, each issue of Chess In Action. We have invested in a printing press and various accessories and hope that there will be enough "odd jobs" to enable us to regain our investment in a few years. Due to our inexperience in these matters there will no doubt be errors (see how many you can find in this issue). The quality of the printing will improve as we gain experience. Some may like this issue, others may not. But the overriding factor is this: We have reduced the cost per issue by over one-half. If everything goes well we will increase the publications of Chess In Action from 4 to 6 times a year.

Chess In Action will continue to publish all tournament announcements, crosstables, and the rating list. An effort will be made to print as many local articles, news items, cartoons, jokes, etc. as we can fit into each issue (there are two articles written by local players in this issue, one by David Glanville and another by Charles Maddigan). There will also be a regular endgame column oriented toward the B and C rated players. The chess problems by James Hurt will continue as a regular column.

We did not and will not change the basic format of Chess In Action. It has always been a good magazine. However, like every new man on the job, we have some new ideas which we would like to try. For example, we are going to add in more articles and an unannotated games section. Some of our ideas will be tried in later issues. But, a large part of the burden is being placed upon you, the PLAYERS. We need articles from you! Anything you wish to contribute will be appreciated. Send all material to the return address (see back cover). The material need not be typed, but it must be legible.

You will see some changes in the next few issues. They may be good, bad, or indifferent (we hope that they'll be good!). But please be assured that we are trying to promote CHESS and to encourage CHESS ACTIVITIES in the area. But we cannot do this alone. We need you to join us. This does not mean that you should just turn in your games or articles for publication. It is infinitely more important that you should be active in promoting Chess. This can be done in various ways: playing at your local chess club, participating in tournaments, making an effort to encourage new players, and introducing the game to others. We promise to do our share.



## ENLIGHTENING ENDGAMES

by RICHARD LEE

This column will only contain common endgame positions which will intrigue and arouse your interest. When there are exceptions to a position it will be noted in the column. I hope you will enjoy this feature and that further study of these positions will enhance your chess ability.

### Rook vs. Rook and Pawn Endings

This endgame is the most common endgame. There are many variations to Rook endings. The basic fundamentals are represented by the following examples.


A rule of thumb is: The game can be drawn by the defender if the defending King can reach the queening squares; if not, the game is lost.

There are various exceptions to this rule. The defender will lose if he:

1. Immobilizes his Rook,
2. Unnecessarily allows his King to be driven away from the queening square, or
3. Moves his King to the wrong square.

The following are examples of the above exceptions:

### Example of Exception #1




Black's Rook is immobilized because of the constant mating threat.

1. R-R7 R-B1
2. R-N7 ch K-B1
3. R-KR7 K-N1
4. P-B7 ch K-B1
5. R-R8 ch K-K2
6. RxR etc.

If the Pawn is a Knight or Rook Pawn the game is drawn due to the lack of a constant mating threat.

### Example of Exception #2




1. R-B7 ch      K-K1
  2. R-KR7      R-Q6 ? (a)
  3. K-K6 !      R-K6 ch ? (b)
  4. K-Q6      R-QR6
  5. R-R8 ch      K-B2
  6. R-QB8      R-Q6 !
- Draw

Black allowed his King to be driven off but managed to savage a draw at the last moment. Any move other than 6 ..., R-Q6 loses.

- a) 2. ..., R-QR6 3. K-K6, R-R3 ch. Draw
- b) 3. ..., K-Q1 4. P-Q5, R-Q8. Draw

## AN ANALYSIS OF THE CLASSICAL VARIATION OF THE RUY LOPEZ

by CHARLES MADDIGAN

The Classical Variation of the Ruy Lopez is presently unpopular - perhaps with good reasons. Black's 3. ..., B-B4 looks naive on the surface, as this piece will become exposed to a quick attack via P-B3 and P-Q4. But the play often becomes complex and tactical, and White is forced to play sharply to retain an advantage. An example of this situation is presented below.

1. P-K4      P-K4
2. N-KB3      N-QB3
3. B-N5      B-B4

Black does not attempt to refute White's last move with 3. ..., P-QR3. Perhaps he wishes to avoid the specialized lines of the Exchange Variation.

4. P-B3      N-B3
5. P-Q4      PxP
6. P-K5!      N-K5
7. O-O

Tempting Black to grab another Pawn. But 7. ..., PxP comes to grief after 8. Q-Q5! BxP ch (... , NxBP 9. QxB). 9. K-R1!, P-B4

10. PxP e.p., NxP 11. Q-N5, B-B4 (playing ... PxP would be disasterous, as after 12. BxP White's QB would kill the KB6 square) 12. QxP with a winning attack; e.g., 12. ... R-KN1? 13. R-K1 ch and wins. Not much better is 12. ..., R-B1 13. R-K1 ch, B (or N)-K2 14. B-R6 and winning.

7. ... P-Q4  
8. PxP e.p. O-O  
9. PxPQ QxP

Barden greatly prefers 9. ..., Q-B3 which would give problematical drawing chances. Horowitz, however, recommends Black's last move.

10. PxP R-Q1

But no one recommends this as Black will now be forced to gambit (or just plain "lose") material.


11. Q-B2! NxQP  
12. NxN RxN  
13. B-K3 R-N5  
14. B-Q3

White will win a piece.

14. ... Q-N3  
15. BxN BxB  
16. BxP ch K-R1  
17. PxP QxP ch

17. ..., RxP is not sufficient after 18. Q-K4. Nothing is really sufficient now, but Black has some tactical chances.

18. K-R1 R-KR5



This is the crucial position. How is White best able to preserve his advantage? In Shaw-Maddigan, postal game 1969, White tried 19. Q-Q2? apparently forcing ..., QxQ 20. NxQ, R (or K)xP 21. RxP with a winning ending. But instead of QxQ Black played 19. ..., Q-KN6!. The game continued: 20. K-N1 (20. P-KR3, BxP! 21. K-N1, B-Q2! preparing to play Q-R7 ch and leaving the K-file open. If 22. QxB, Q-R7 ch 23. K-B2, R-B5 ch 24. K-K1, Q-N6 ch 25. K-K2, QxP ch winning the Rook with a crushing attack) ..., QxP ch 21. K-B2, B-R6! 22. K-K1, BxP 23. B-Q3, R-K1 ch 24. K-Q1, BxR 25. QxQ, RxQ 26. BxB, P-KN4 27. P-R4, P-N5 and 28. White resigns. Here it was Black, not White, who simplified into a won ending!

It appears, however, that White can win in the diagrammed position with 19. Q-Q3!. Black is forced to play ..., Q-R3 20. B-K4, P-B4!? hoping for 21. Q-Q8 ch?, K-R2 22. BxP ch, BxB 23. QxR, RxP ch 24. K-N1, Q-R5! forcing mate! Or there is 21. BxP?, RxP ch 22. K-N1, R-R8 ch 23. K-B2, Q-B5 ch winning back a piece with a level game. Thus, after 20. ..., P-B4!? White only has one move - 21. B-Q5! which cuts off the Black King and wins quickly. For example, after 21. ..., RxP ch 22. K-N1, R-R8 ch 23. K-B2, RxR ch 24. QxR, Q-N3 ch 25. K-N3 Black cannot play ..., QxP because of 26. Q-R1 mate!

In conclusion, it seems that White can retain an advantage in this specific line, although he must defend accurately to do so. For a few brief moves, Black holds the initiative in his hands. Given the opportunity, he can very quickly trounce an over-confident opponent!



## AN ANALYSIS OF A "WON" POSITION

by DAVID GLANVILLE

This position was reached in one of my games in the 1967 CFNC Class Championship.



It seems that Black has been completely outplayed, having but a "rimmed" Knight past his second rank. Playing the White pieces, it was my move. My thinking was something like this:

"I've got Black backed up against the wall. Surely there must be a quick win here. I'll take some extra time and make sure that I don't leave a piece en prise". If 19. N-N5, PxN then 20. B-R7, K-R1 21. BxP and wins (e.g., 21. ..., N-N3 22. BxB, QxB (not 22. ..., KxB 23. BxN) 23. BxN, PxR 24. QxP

with a winning attack; or if 21. ..., P-Q3, 22. P-K6!).

19. N-N5      K-R1

"He didn't even think about taking the Knight, If 20. N-R7, R-N1 21. N-B6!, PxN 22. BxP ch, R-N2 23. R-N3, N-N3 24. BxR ch KxB and Black has two pieces for the Rook. But now, 25. P-K6!!, threatening PxP, gives Black a lost game: 25. ..., QPxP 26. PxP, BxP 27. RxR, QxB 28. BxN, PxR 29. QxP ch and wins. A sure and clean-cut combination! With 3 minutes left on my clock, I had better hurry.

20. N-R7      R-N1  
21. N-B6      PxN  
22. BxP ch      R-N2  
23. R-N3      N-N3  
24. BxR ch      KxB

Quickly, I again checked 25. P-K6, QPxP 26. PxP, BxP 27. RxR, QxB 28. BxN, PxR 29. QxP ch. However, in time pressure, the mental analysis produced a hallucination, making me think that I would have been two pawns to a piece down! Therefore, I did not play 25. P-K6. Hurrying along...

25. Q-Q2      QxP  
26. R-K1      Q-Q3  
27. Q-Q4 ch      Q-B3  
White lost on time

This is an example of over-confidence. White was so sure of winning that he became careless of time and then suffered from a hallucination, as the line starting with 25. P-K6 was perfectly sound.

### POT POURRI

It appears that Bobby Fischer has already eliminated himself from the next World Chess Championship Match. In order to qualify for the Interzonal tournament, he must qualify from the zone (USA, in this case). To qualify from the USA zone, you must be one of the top three finishers in the 1969 U.S. Championship being currently held in New York. Bobby Fischer does not appear to be entered in this tournament.

#### Hint to teaching Chess:

Have the student move the Knight from one corner to the opposite corner in the minimum number of moves. This will demonstrate some of the thought and logic involved in Chess.

The 5th Annual OAKLAND HOBBY SHOW will be held on April 11-12, 1970.

The Oakland Chess Club will participate for its fourth time. In the past, their exhibit has been excellent and attracts quite a crowd with their simultaneous exhibitions.


