The Golden Bear Open Chess Tournament By MARTIN MORRISON and ELWIN MEYERS En Passant Editors

On May 20 and 21 the University of California, Berkeley (UC) Chess Club and the Union Program Board will sponsor the Golden Bear Open Chess Tournament. This tournament is to be a fiveround Swiss System Tournament open to all who are, or who become, members of both the United States Chess Federation (\$10.00) and the California State Chess Federation (\$2.50). In addition to the membership fees participants will be required to pay an entry fee of \$12.50 (for players rated 1900 and above, USCF) or \$12.50 (for players rated up through 1899, USCF). A package deal for UC students (with registration cards) who are unrated and not members of the United States Chess Federation nor the California State Chess Federation, at the price of \$15.00 entire. USCF membership cards must be presented at the time of registration. \$1.00 will be deducted from the entry fee for those who submit advance paid entries.

The following prizes are guaranteed: First place (\$125), second place (\$70), third place (\$35), best "A" (\$40), best "B" (30), best "& Unrated" (\$20), and best "C Student" (\$50). The prize fund will be expanded if entries permit.

The round schedule is as follows round one (10:00 a.m. May 20), round two (3:00 p.m.), round three (7:00 p.m.), round four (10:00 a.m. May 21), round five (3:00 p.m.). Players are requested to bring chess sets and clocks.

Many people still do not completely understand the rating system used to depermine their EECA chess ratings. The system actually is identical to that used for USCF and DFNC ratings, so a knowledge of the EECA system will be transferable to those other systems.

The best way to look at the system is to realize that sixteen points are at stake in every game in which the two players are of equal strength. If the players are not of equal strength, adjustments for this fact have to be made. The actual process of determining the ratings is somewhat complicated, so I shall put all the information needed in the following for convenience; sake,

If one uses this table, finding ratings should be relatively easy. The general theory of the system is that the greater the difference in rating between the players, the less points the higher-rated player obtains for a win, the more the lower-rated player obtains for a win. Let us take hypothetical examples.

Example 1. Player A is 1650, player B is 1750. Player B wins. First, determine the difference in rating between the players. In this case it is 100 points. The higher-rated player won, so look under column #1. The amount of points at stake; on the game under these circumstances is listed as 12. THE FIGURE GIVEN IN THE TABLE IS ALWAYS ADDED TO THE WINNER'S RATING AND SUBTRACTED FROM THE LOSER'S RATING (EXCEPT IN THE CASE OF A DRAW). In this case, player A would have a new rating of 1650-12, or 1638; player B would have 1750/12, or 1762.

Example 2. Player A is 1650; player B is 1750. Player A wins. Once again the fifference in rating is 100 points. Since in this case the lower-rated player won, look under column #2 opposite 88-112 points. The figure is 20. So 20 points are added to the winner's rating and 20 points are subtracted from the loser's rating. Player A would then have: 1650/20, or 1670. Player B would have 1750-20, or 1730.

Example 3. Player A (1650) draws with player B (1650). Difference in ratings: 100 points. Under the draw column (#3)

"In many two-movers the key move, some of Black's defenses, and the ensuing mating moves all play a part in the theme that is being illustrated. In other problems the interest may bee chiefly in only two of these moves. The key move and Black's defenses may make up the thematic content of the problem, the mating moves in themselves being uninteresting, or a problem may be composed to show certain Black manoeuvers and the resulting mates, the composer providing the best key that he can after the position is otherwise complete. Again the chief feature of a composition may lie in just one of these moves. Some problems are compose to show striking keywoves, otherse, to illustrate strategic Black defenses. Likewise, there are two-movers composed primarily for Whites mating moves." Thus Kenneth S. Howard in The Enjoyment of Chess Problems (Dover Publications, New York, Third Revised Edition, c. 1961) begins his chapter on "The Mating Move," Try your skill on the above problems exemplifying "mating moves in the main-plays ... of particular interest because they form an essential part of a striking theme."
