The solution to last issues end game problem:
Position: white, K on K3, P's on KN5 and KB6
black, K on QN7, R on KB8

A) White to move and win B) Black to move and draw

A: 1. K-Q4! This brings the King closer to the pawns and at the same time disallows the black King to follow. If now 1.--- R-B4, so 2. K-K4 RXNP, 3.P-B7 and the Rook can't catch-up any more.

If 1.--- K-N6 so 2. K-Q5 K-B6, 3. K-K6 K-Q5, 4. P-B7 and wins

B: 1. --- K-B6 ! 2. K-K4 K-**B** 5, 3. K-K5 R-KN8 4. P-B7 RxP ch 5. K-K4 R-N8 draw.

It was played at the team match Concord vs. Fremont 1972 Annotations by Rick Price.

1.2.		c7 <b>-</b> c5	The Wing Gambit. It is an off-beat line used to catch an opponent off-guard.
2.3.	a2-a3	c5xb4 d7=d5	But its soundness is questionable.  The best way to refute a gambit.  An alternative is 3 b4xa3, 4.Nb1xa3 d7-d6, 5. Bc1-b2 Nb8-c6, 6.d2-d4 Ng8-f6 7. Bf1-d3 e7-e6, 8. Ng1-f3 Bf8-e7, 9. 0-0 0-0, = (Marshall-Samisch, Baden-Baden 1925 Boleslawski says 3 b4xa3 ? 4.Nb1xa3 d7-d6, 5. Bc1-b2 Ng8-f6 6. Bf1-c4 Nb8-c6, 7. Qd1-e2 g7-g6 8. 13. 14. 15. 16.	0-0 <b>R</b> Rf1-e1 Be2-d3 Ba3-c5	Rf8-e8 Qd8-c7 h7-h6 Bc8-e6	White was threatening 17. Bc5-b6, though slightly better perhaps, was 16 Bc8-g4. At this time White has only taken 33 minutes to 7 !? for Black (40/1½)
17. 18.	Qb1-b2 Bd3xf5	Be6-f5	Other moves are inferior e.g. 18.Bc5xe7 Bf5xd3, followed by 19e4-65 and 20Bd3xc4
18. 19.	g2-g4 ?	Ne7xf5	A serious antipositional move, weakening whites King-side pawns. Better 19.Ra1-b2
20. 21.	g4xf5 ?! Kg1- h1 ?	e4xf3 Black won	Here ? 20.Nf3-d4 is whites only hope.  Whites best seem to be 21.Bc5-e3 though Re8-e4! wins for if 22.Be3xh6 Re4-g4 ch 23.Kg1-h1 Rg4-g2! wins.
If 2	21. Re1xe8 so 24. Ra1-g1 Re8	Ra8xe8, 22.H	3c5xa7 ? Qc7-f4 !, 23.Kg1-h1 Qf4-g5
